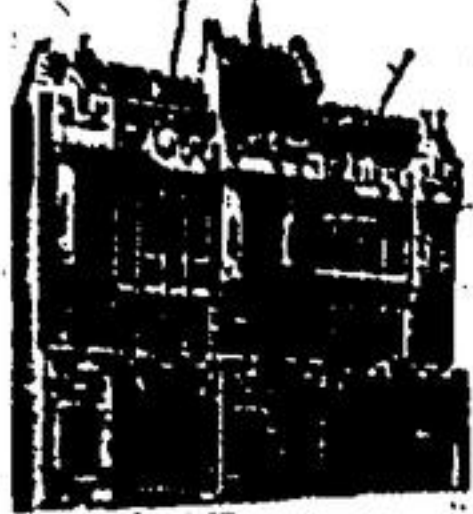

A DAY AT GEORGETOWN FAIR

Friday and Saturday September 12th and 13th are two days that will remain in the minds of young and old, it being the two days of Georgetown Fall Fair. I will take you on a tour throughout the fair.

As you enter the gates on your right you see the General Exhibits building. We shall go in and see what they have for us. On the left there is a booth sponsored by the Canadian National Institute for the Blind. There were leather goods and a woman doing Braille. Next there was the Norval Junior Institute. They had hooked rugs and knitted goods. They occupied the one end of the hall. On the next stand there was the Georgetown Public School crafts and drawings. There also was a stand of Home-crafts such as handbags and needle-work. On the right was the wonderful quilt work done by Ashgrove and Norval ladies. The Limehouse ladies gardening was very good - enormous sizes of pumpkins and other garden products.

On the right side of the Hall was the Home and Country work by Halton Women's Institute. They had a miniature barnyard featuring farm products. At the west end of the hall was the Domestic Science which was very interesting to young and old. On the left hand side between the door and the end was the farm products display with potatoes from all over Halton County. Right beside the Farm products is the Boy Scouts refreshment booth which was very tempting. In the centre of the building was the Halton County flower show which was very beautiful. On the end of the stand was the Commercial Dairy feature with graded milk from different Halton county towns.

I think we have seen everything in the building so we will continue up the midway which was provided by rides from Sauble Beach, Dawson from Toronto and Stanger Shows from Winnipeg. There were also hot dog booths from different organizations.

Tory Gregg did a good job of master of ceremonies conducting the horse racing etc.

I would like to mention that the new livestock building was very helpful to the cattlemen and judges. That concludes another successful year of Georgetown Fair.

HALTON FORUMS PLAN FOR WINTER PROGRAM

With the approach of fall county forums are making plans for the season of Monday broadcasts which originate in the CBC broadcasting studios and are heard throughout Canada by farm groups which meet from house to house, in schoolhouses and public halls, to listen to the broadcast and discuss the subject matter among themselves.

Ontario has a new provincial secretary this year, Clifford Waite who replaces Clare Hurt, secretary for several seasons. Mr. Waite was introduced at a meeting of the board, which included county secretaries, recently at the Ontario College of Education, Toronto.

Mr. Waite reported that in 48 Ontario counties there are a total of 793 forums. Floyd Griesbach from the national executive, asked for volunteer groups for the pre-testing of the forum guide and Halton was one of three which volunteered. These pre-testing groups are held five weeks before the forum guide goes to press.

Average collection per forum on a provincial basis last year was \$20.83. Halton's average was \$22.05. The pre-forum broadcast is scheduled for October 27th and the regular series starts November 3rd.

Rural Night School Scheduled for Milton
