Miss Annie Brown of Toronto was a visitor with Mr. and Mrs. Mortram for the week-end.

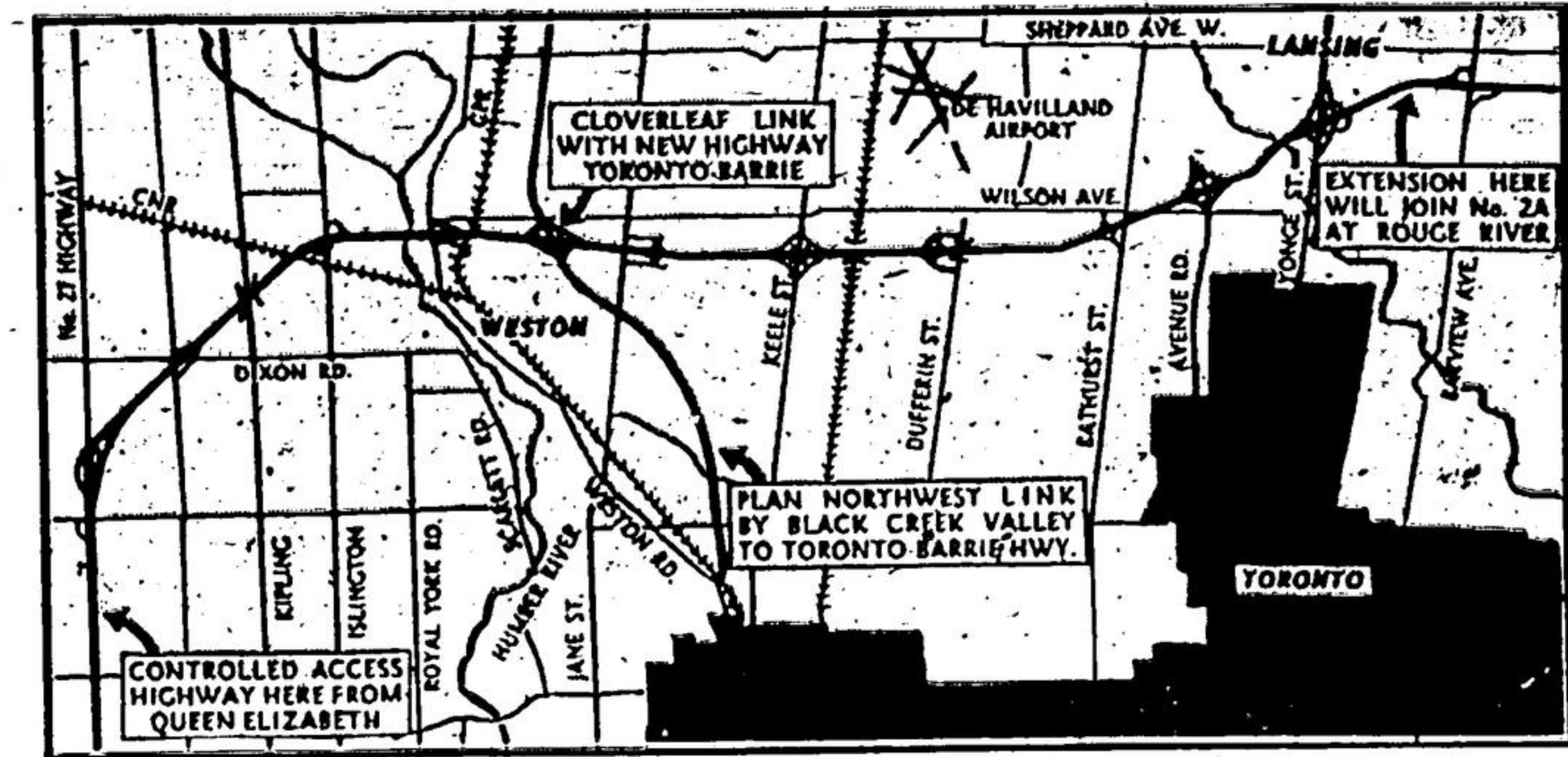
