Former Pastor at Baptist Anniversary

On Sunday the Georgetown Baptist Church celebrated its One Hundred and Fifteenth anniversary. A large congregation greeted its former pastor, Rev. C. R. Gower, of Dresden. Mr. Gower, of Brampton, was soloist.

Mr. Gower took for his morning text Romans 12:1 "I beseech you, therefore, Brethren, by the mercies of God, that ye present your bodies, a living sacrifice, holy, acceptable, unto God, which is your reasonable service." He pointed out the necessity of the consecration of the physical body of a proper home in which the spirit of God may dwell. In the evening, his sermon subject was "The Church Yesterday and Today." Mr. Gower forcefully presented the urgent need of the wholly consecrated life of the church member, that our modern Church has suffered because of the compromised position of its Church members. Its witness thereby has been weakened.

Mr. Evans' solo in the morning was "How Lovely Are Thy Dwellings" and the Choir under the direction of Mrs. W. Townsend sang "Father in Heaven." At the evening service Mr. Evans again sang, this time choosing "Open the Gates of the Temple." The anthem was "Come Unto Me."

The church was tastefully decorated with gladioli. A few pictures of the Church in the early days were displayed in the vestibule.

Re-elected Director of Anglers' Federation

Harry Adams, a director of Georgetown Anglers and Hunters Club was re-elected a director of the Huron and Erie Zone, of the Ontario Federation at the annual meeting in Hamilton on Saturday and Sunday.

A suggestion by the Dept. of Lands and Forests that non-resident fishermen be allowed to go home with a two-day, rather than a one-day catch was turned down unanimously by the 120 delegates, representing 60 clubs in the region.

Speakers at the meeting included Professor N. W. Radford of McMaster University and Dr. A. E. Berry of the Ontario Dept. of Health, as well as F. A. MacDougall, deputy minister of the Lands & Forests Dept. Dr. A. A. Kingscote of the Ontario Veterinary College spoke on Sunday.
