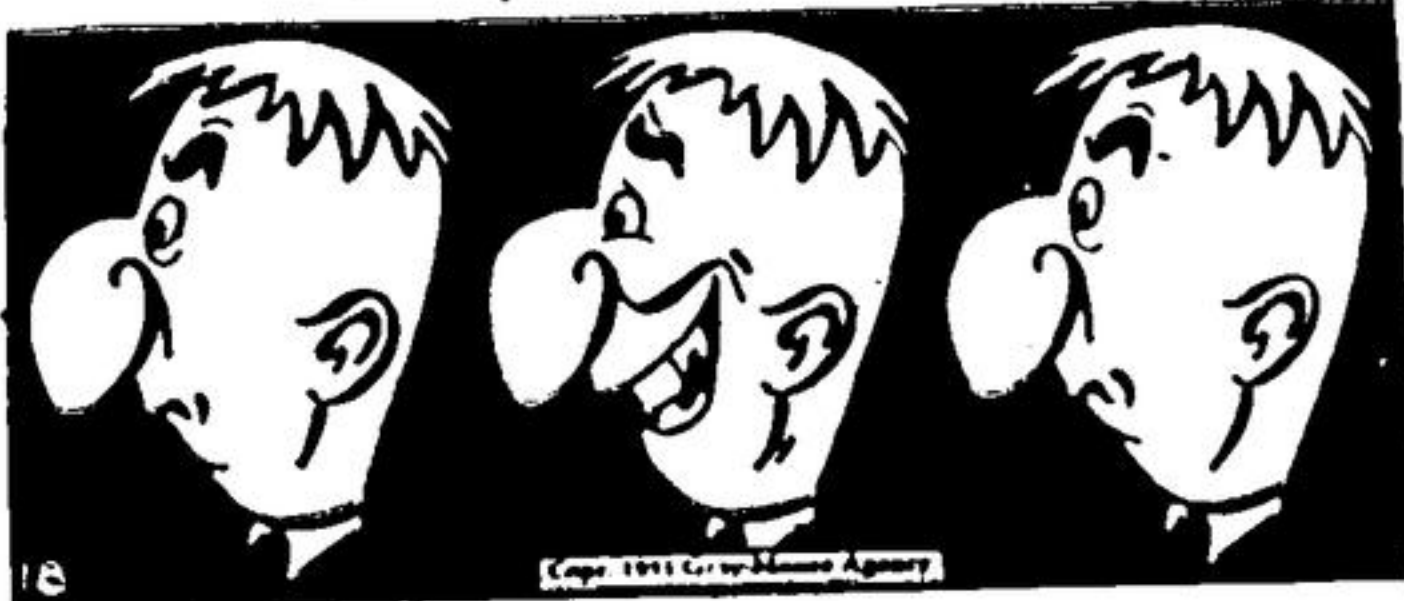

**Charles Preston is
91 Years Old Today**

Today, Charles Henry Preston of Glen Williams celebrates his 91st birthday.

Mrs. Preston's wife died in 1931. Of a family of nine children, five are living. Mrs. William Lorrimer and George Preston, Glen Williams, James, Herb and Henry of town. Mrs. Robert Addy is a sister and his two brothers living, Joe Preston, Brampton and Alfred Preston, Portage-la-Prairie, Man. Mr. Preston is the oldest member of a family of sixteen.

**Ross McGill Home
From Manitoulin**

Home again after being hospitalized a month in Little Current, Manitoulin Island, after an accident, Ross McGill is convalescing nicely at home, though it will still be some time before he is able to be around again.

An item in last week's Manitoulin Examiner has this to say about Ross, under the heading "Bed-bound Fisherman Threat to Manitoulin Fish in '53":

Ross McGill, 16 of Georgetown, went home last week under different circumstances than he arrived on Manitoulin Island in mid-August. He came on a bicycle but he went home on a bed. The bed was carried in Red Lodge's station wagon for the 400-mile trip to his home.

Ross has already spent four weeks in St. Joseph's Hospital here as a result of an accident. He will spend another four weeks or so in bed at home. He got a broken pelvis, spinal injuries, and lacerations when he was knocked from his bicycle.

"The boys is a fishing fool," his friend George Bishop told The Examiner. "Back last winter he made up his mind to come to Manitoulin this summer fishing. He worked all summer to get enough money together for the trip, rode his bike all the way from Georgetown, and then — just two miles from Red Lodge — didn't he meet with the accident that put him in hospital, and where he is."

"He never even got to our place. He was riding along the road when the steering cam broke on Leland Parkinson's truck. The driver lost control. He was going the same way as the boys, slammed into and over young Ross McGill, and Ross went to the hospital where he has been until we took him home."

But Ross says he's coming back for sure, and he's really going to get some fish — next year.

The next public holiday in Georgetown will be Thanksgiving Day, Monday, October 13th.
