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What Council Did

ON MONDAY, OCTOBER 6th

Heard from **Ellis Bouteille**, president of the Chamber of Commerce of progress to date in encouraging new industry in Georgetown.

Mr. Bouteille said that the Chamber has prepared a booklet of information about the town. When an enquiry is received, a copy of this is sent, with the advice that the council's industrial committee will proceed from there. The C of C has suggested that advertising be run in the Windsor paper, soliciting "feeder" industries for the new Ford plant in Oakville.

Mayor Armstrong thanked Mr. Bouteille for his information and work. Up to the present, he said, there had only been one enquiry which might have led to a new industry, and the fact that Georgetown has no level building location was a deterring factor. Council has considered, he said, making an agreement with a private property owner to level his property with the stipulation that the property must be offered for sale for industrial use for a certain period of time.

Will have the property committee investigate and make a recommendation on an offer by Frank Whitmee to purchase town owned property behind his Young Street home.

Accepted a tender of Armstrong Brothers Construction, Brampton, for constructing 5,000 feet of new sidewalk which has been requested by ratepayers in various sections of town. The firm tendered 39c a square foot, with some extra charges for excavation and fill. It was one of two tenders received, the other, from Halton Paving & Contracting, Oakville, being higher. The work will start at once.

Sidewalks to be constructed include both sides of Normandy Blvd.; north side of Caroline Street; east side of Chapel Street; south side of No. 7 highway from Normandy Blvd. to the town limits.

Reeve Marshall voted against the latter because, he said, he believed the money could be better spent on sidewalk repairs in other parts of town at present, and the highway sidewalk delayed till a later date.

Will put 6" water mains on Young St. from Market to Edith at a cost of \$800 and on Chapel East from Guelph to Victoria, at a cost of \$1500.

Granted the Boy Scouts permission to have Apple Day on October 25th and the Poppy Day committee for Poppy Day on November 8th.

Engaged Hamilton Excavating, Guelph to instal sewers in the Orr survey.

Were informed by solicitor Harry Willis that the five north Halton municipalities had been relieved from further participation in the current assessment squabble in the lower part of the county, and that he does not believe his services in the case are further needed.

Will investigate a possible amendment to the building by-law whereby permission to build on subdivisions not approved by the Dept. of Planning could be refused.

The question came up in connection with the Tyers subdivision, where the town has signified that no town services will be installed until the proper government approval for the subdivision is received. The building inspector has been asked to refer applicants for building permits to the council, concerning what services they are liable to get.

Changed the night for nomination meeting from the Monday before election day to the Thursday previous, which will provide a ten-day period.

Election day is Monday, December 8 and nomination meeting will be Thursday, November 28th. In view of the large number of voters in Ward 2, this year a second polling place will be provided in College View, which will serve residents on that side of the railway tracks. Polling places, deputy returning officers and poll clerks were tentatively named.

Industrial chairman Sargent said the Dept. of Planning seemed to favour council's plan of levelling a potential industrial property. At present, he had been told, there is not too much activity in industrial placement in Ontario. There has been one enquiry recently from a dry goods manufacturing concern about a possible location here.

JAMES NICKELL, 84 FARMER TWIN DIES

Member of a pioneer Limehouse family, James Nickell, 84 died in Hamilton General Hospital on Friday.

The Nickells have been residents of the district since William Nickell emigrated from Ireland in 1812. He was the third settler in Esquering and first farmed at Dolly Varden, Limehouse which is still owned by the family.

Mr. Nickell was a son of James Nickell and Sarah Woods and spent all his life at Limehouse until two years ago. He was a resident of Halton Centennial Manor at Milton. His wife, Mary Wheeler, died in 1922.

Surviving are his twin brother, John of Eden Mills and two sisters, Mrs. Minnie Graham, Winnipeg, Man. and Mrs. Edith Wetherill, Toronto. Members of the family who predeceased him were Mrs. Hugo Bell, Toronto, William Nickell, Sarnia and Dr. Robert Nickell, who was a veterinarian in Georgetown.
