Heard from Eliff Boutelle, president' of the Chamber of Commerce of progress to date in encouraging new industry in Georgetown.

Mr. Boutelle said that the Chamber has prepared a booklet of information about the town. When an enquiry is received, a copy of this is sent, with the advice that the council's industrial committee will proceed from there. The C of C has suggested that advertising be runen the Windsor paper, solieiting 'Yeeder' industries for the rew Ford plant in Oakville.

Mayor Armstrong thanked Mr. Boutelle for his information and Up to the present, he said, there had only been one enquiry a new industry, and the fact that Georgetown has no level building location was a deterring factor. Council has considered, he said, making an agreement with a private property owner to level his property with the stipulation that the property must be offered for sale for industrial use for a certain period of time.

Accepted a tender of Armstrong Brothers Construction, Hrampton, for constructing 5,000 feet of new sidewalk which has been requested by ratepayers in various sections of The firm tendered 30c a square foot, with some extra chargest for excavation and fill. It was one of two tenders received, the other, from Halton Paving & Contracting. Oakville, being higher. The work will start at once.

Sidewalks to be constructed include both sides of Normandy Blvd. north side of Caroline Street; east side of Chapel Street; south side of No. 7 highway from Normandy Blvd. to the town limits.
