Dolsons have farmed the land since 1818 when William Dunn Dolson came up from Pennsylvania and with his wife settled on Lot 17, 30th Line West which was a crown land owned by his trade, Manly, Flint, and his wife. In 1848 he owned and farmed 1100 acres. Seven sons continued in the district, each with his own farm and Thomas O. son of Stephen, is the third generation on the farm which was owned by his father before him.
