

## What Council Did

ON TUESDAY, OCTOBER 14th

Will round off the Queen Street Highway corner as much as possible without encroaching on private property, and instal an extra catch basin.

For some time there has been discussion about this, and at one time, it was talked of buying a strip of property from Harry Scott. An estimate of \$1300 had been given for the work, and the mayor reported Mr. Scott's offer on his property as \$300.

Council adjourned and looked over the situation before making a final decision. Members felt that the advantage gained in the improvement did not justify as high an expenditure. What is being done will be at a much lower cost.

Will pave an additional 9-foot width on the west side of Main Street from Church to Factory, which will give extra parking space downtown.

Will not lower the pavement on Dr. McAllister's side of Main Street North, when it was found that this would create difficulties for other private property in the area.

A nuisance exists at present and Dr. McAllister has been urging that a steep driveway into his property be fixed. It was thought that to do a proper job, it would be necessary to lower the sidewalk two feet. Complaints have since been received that this would create a nuisance for the Baptist Church and parsonage.

Mayor Armstrong acknowledged the nuisance to Dr. McAllister, but said he could see no advantage in overcoming one difficulty and creating others. Cr. Goodlet, referring to the possible removal of some trees in the district, said the day is coming when trees can't be left on Main Street because they look pretty. The business section has to grow, he pointed out.

Will have Marshall Motors supply air cylinders for the Fire Dept. recussiator, the town paying a \$27 deposit for 5 years, and \$3.20 per cylinder. This, explained Cr. Hale, who made the motion, is cheaper than the present method of purchasing.

Will used crushed gravel to dress the side of roads which are at present being surfaced by King Paving Co.

Are seeking an immediate solution to a water problem which exists on Jack Tost's property adjoining Normandy Blvd. and the public school property.

A tile which allows natural drainage through the Tost property is damaged and in spring backs up and creates a lake which in places is 12 feet deep. Mayor Armstrong said he was concerned about the hazard to children and wants the matter cleared up before the winter freeze-up. It was the opinion of members who had looked over the situation that the tile is broken and should either be replaced, or a gully created which would allow the water to drain naturally. A legal opinion last year was that the town was not responsible for fixing the drain. Cr. Goodlet said that it is council's responsibility to force Mr. Tost to clear the tile. Cr. Petch suggested a meeting with Mr. Tost to see if some amicable arrangement cannot be arrived at with the town helping to clear up the situation and possibly supplying tile for repairs.

Another drainage problem on Emery Street has been occupying council's attention. In this case, K. C. Lindsay's property has been flooded from time to time. Council feels most of the water is coming from a defective tank at the CNR station, and will ask the CNR to remedy this. Meanwhile, the town will put a ditch on Mr. Lindsay's side of Emery St.

A request from William Clark for a cinder walk or sidewalk into his property on a right-of-way from Victoria Crescent, had council opinion that Mr. Clark should pay any costs involved if this were done. It was pointed out that he pays no Local Improvement charge on sewers to his property because he has no street frontage on which this can be charged.
