Forecast Record Payroll Sales of Savings Bonds

Purchases of Canada Savings Bonds in Ontario under the Payroll Savings Plan will reach a record total this year, N. D. Young, Ontario regional director of the plan forecast. Sale of bonds began October 14th.

"There is a definite indication in reports from organizers that the \$90,000,000 in bonds sold last year under the Payroll Savings Plan will no longer stand as a record for Ontario," Mr. Young said. For the past two weeks a team of 57 trained workers have been assisting in setting up the payroll savings plan in some 1,800 of Ontario's largest plants with employees totaling more than 800,000. Last year some 48 per cent of these employees purchased bonds. It is expected this year that considerably more than 50 per cent will take advantage of the plan and will purchase more than half of the total raised in Canada through Payroll Savings.
