**Pre-Anniversary Service Held at St. John's Church**

Sunday morning at St. John's United Church, the service was a pre-anniversary one, with the meditation centering around "Anniversary Reflections." The Scripture reading from Nehemiah told of Nehemiah's leadership in rebuilding the walls of Jerusalem, with his announcement at its accomplishment, "So built we the wall, and all the wall was joined together, for the people had a mind to work."

And from Luke a few verses "For which of you, intending to build a tower, sitteth not down first and counteth the cost, then satisfied, goes ahead and turns not back." Rev. John M. Smith built his meditation on the memorial action of Joshua, who, after the Children of Israel had passed safely over Jordan and into their promised land, commanded a man out of each of the twelve tribes, to carry a stone on his shoulder out of Jordan, to be placed as a cairn and left in the place where they lodged that night, to be a memorial unto the children of Israel for ever. And God meant this to be a sign unto them, that when their children asked "What mean ye by these stones?" they were to be able to answer them, telling of God's miraculous leading of His people over Jordan into a land of their own, making of them a new nation in history, the birth of a nation which has survived the many vicissitudes of history through many centuries of time and a nation which is probably still able to tell its children of God's great doings with it in the past.

Anniversary is naturally a time when we look back, and in the case of a church, ask "What mean ye by these stones?" They are a memorial to a faithful group of God's children willing to sacrifice to build a house for the worship of God acknowledging His guidance and goodness; and also to many Christian men and women since, who have added to and sustained God's work as David commanded Solomon to do, when he himself could not build-God's house. And as we look back in thanksgiving for the many positive blessings which the influence of 113 years of St. John's existence and a similar period of work and worship of the other churches in the community, has brought to us, let us be grateful for the many things of evil which have not happened to us because of their being here; hurts and pitfalls which so easily could have been and which all history teaches us, follow neglect of remembrance of God. And let us be thankful for the character building in young men and women which our churches have been doing, enabling them to go out into the world and resist its temptations to evil, and caused them to help in the building and maintaining of God's house and worship in other places; and particularly for those who have given themselves to full time service in this land and others.

And in gratitude and thanksgiving let us look forward to "adding to God's house all that is necessary to sustain it and increase its in-

fluence in accomplishing that whereunto it was built, to bring to all mankind a saving knowledge of Jesus, a knowledge of God's love for all His creation, and going into all the world and preaching the Gospel to every creature."

The anthem was "O Come Let Us Worship", with Mrs. Howard Wrigglesworth taking the solo part. Albert Tost sang "The Holy Hour." Evening service was withdrawn for worship with Knox Presbyterian Church on the occasion of their anniversary.

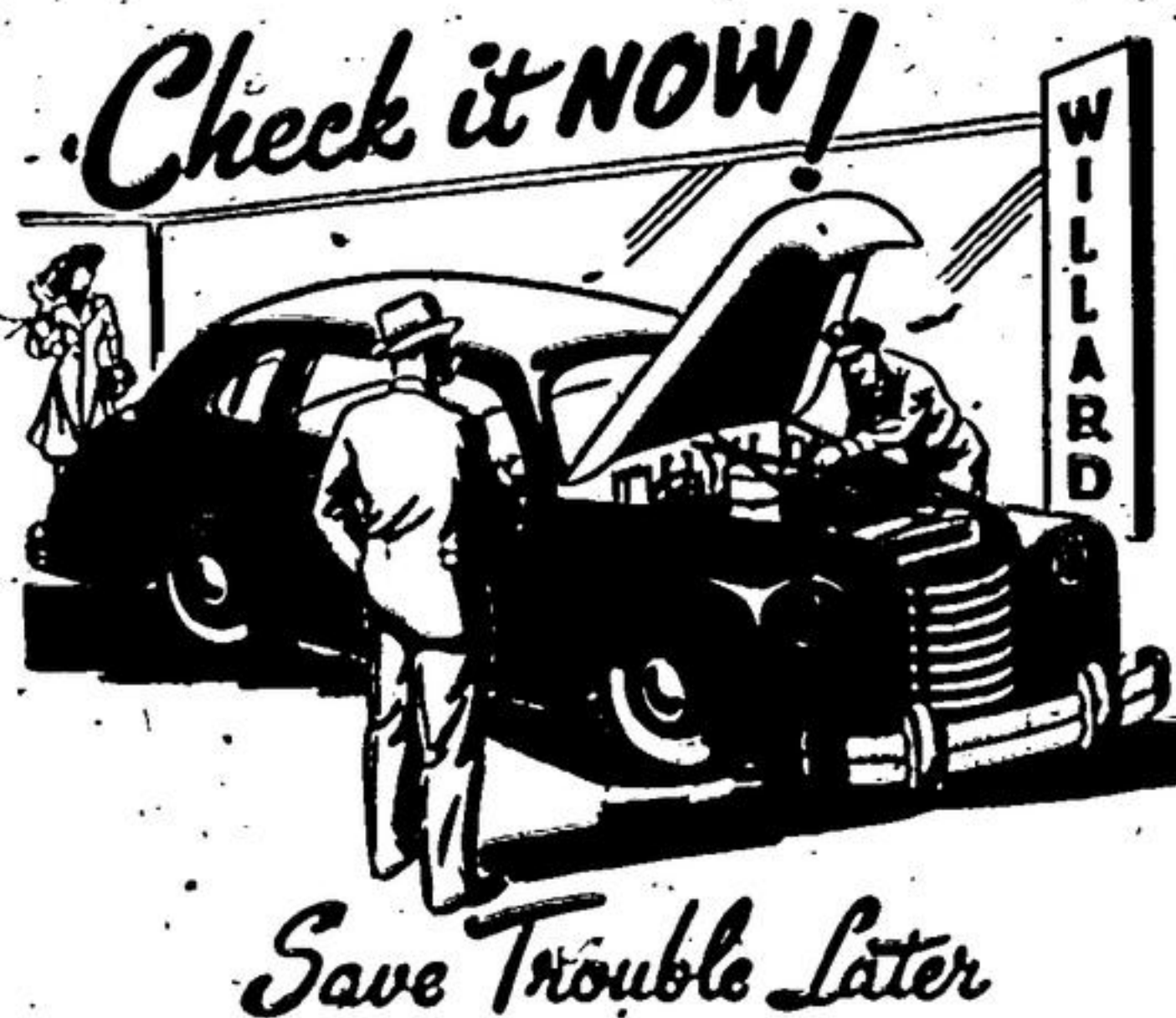
Time we were catching up with the season's Bowling News in our first column this season.
