Former Fire Chief Prevention Speaker

Harry Savings, former chief of Georgetown Fire Brigade gave a constructive talk on fire prevention as a feature of Fire Prevention Week to the Local Council of Women at their meeting on Friday at the home of Mrs. J. B. Mackenzie.

He cited the fact that the annual Canadian fire loss is colossal and as losses increase, insurance rates rise accordingly. We hear about the big fires, but there are innumerable small unpublicized ones which are costly too, and could easily have been prevented by care in the handling of: paint covered brushes and cloths; wax heating on stoves; gasoline cleaning fluids; quick drying paints and bleaches; hot ashes not in metal containers; fats on stoves; imported inflammable toys; electrical gadgets imported from countries where inspection is not as rigid as in Canada.

Indoor Christmas trees are a potent source of fire. If kept indoors more than a day or two, the tree should stand in water or wet sand, said Mr. Savings, and it should not be near an electrical outlet where a static spark could ignite it. Tree lights should not be left burning for long periods of time, cotton batting is dangerous as tree trimming, children should be educated to the menace of matches and fire-crackers, were some of the hints given. He reminded the ladies that this is the season to have pipes and equipment cleaned and inspected.

Mr. Savings explained that the local brigade, composed of fire chief William Hyde and 24 men are on 24 hour call, and also will inspect property and equipment for fire prevention. The chief makes an annual report to the Fire Marshall on causes and losses and his district is rated accordingly. Georgetown has an excellent rating, he was pleased to report.

Mrs. Jesse Wyatt presided at the meeting. A five dollar donation was voted to the Poppy Fund. Mrs. W. E. Nodwell and Mrs. F. W. Johnson were appointed as a nominating committee to report at the November meeting. This will be held at Mrs. Johnson's home on Friday the 21st at an earlier hour, 2.30 p.m.

Bulletins from National Council headquarters included copies of letters from the Minister of Justice in reply to a letter sent him concerning legislation against salacious literature, from the Deputy Minister on family allowances, and from the External Affairs Dept. about the United Nations "Committee on Status of Women" being invited to hold a meeting in Canada.

The monthly newsletter had items of interest about women elected to the BC legislature and a report of the Vancouver convention of Canadian Business and Professional Women.

Refreshments were served by Miss H. A. Staunton and Miss Isabel Preston.

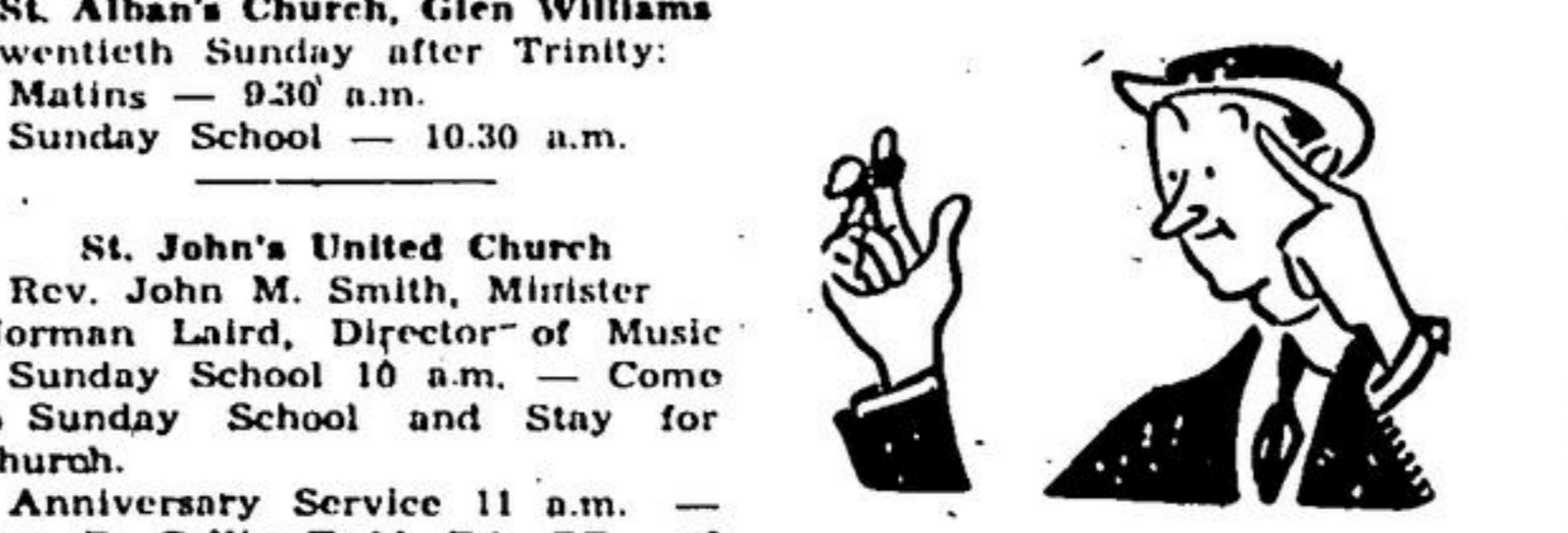
