

GEORGETOWN HIGH SCHOOL WINS FOUR SCHOOL MEET

Georgetown High School athletes took three championships, a special half mile trophy and the grand championship of the four-school track and field meet here on Saturday.

A new percentage system of tabulating was used for the first time, to give the smaller Erin school a fairer chance. Final results showed Georgetown in the lead with 89.94 and Erin in second place with 72.3. Milton, last year's champion, placed second to Georgetown in actual scoring and third in the computations with 60.58. Action had 80.75.

Georgetown's win was all the more sweet because three star athletes were out of action. Jim Tumbach had been counted on to win the pole vault until his accident at practice a few weeks ago. Ross McGill, back to school but still recuperating from injuries received in an auto accident last summer, was unable to compete in the high jump. Terry Norton, intermediate champion at the school field day, came second in the pole vault, then twisted his ankle in the high jump and was out of further competition for the day.

Paul Barber won the Tom Watson trophy in the special half mile race. Previous winner of the trophy was also a Georgetown boy, Bill MacCormack.
