SEVEN HEAD EXCEED \$400 AT CATTLE SALE

Seven head each brought better than \$400 at the dispersal sale of the Glynden herd of pure bred Holsteins of Elmer H. Waite, of Streetsville, which was held October 7th at the Hays Sale Arena, Oakville. The 43 head realized \$12,135 for a general average of \$282.

Highest price was \$475 paid by Stanley Kogut, Bramford, for Glynden Ajax Aggie, a five year old cow.

Second highest price paid was \$460 by W. G. Barchard, Newcastle for a four-year-old heifer. Mr. Barchard also bought a three-year-old at \$410. Miss Helen H. Howell, Canaville paid \$440 for a five year old cow; Emerson Ford, Hornby, \$425 for a seven year old; Grant Cranston, Glanford Station, \$425 for a three year old; and John Johnson, Brampton, \$400 for a three-year-old.

Top price for a bred heifer was \$370, paid by C. McDowell, Hornby.

The 22 milking females sold averaged \$312; 5 bred heifers \$318, 11 open heifers \$210 and 5 heifer calves \$173.00.
