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McPHAIL SUCCEEDS CLEAVER CONTESTS NEXT ELECTION

At the largest Liberal convention ever held in Halton County, Murray McPhail of Campbellville was elected a candidate in the next Federal election, by an overwhelming majority over John Kehoe of Burlington and Reeve Edward Lauder of Oakville, on Saturday evening in Milton town hall.

The new Liberal standard bearer is 39 years of age, and a native of Campbellville, the farm, which is still in the family and on which he was born being bequeathed to his grandfather by the Crown. For some years Mr. McPhail has been secretary of the Ontario Retail Seed Dealers' Association and commutes daily to his Toronto office. He is superintendent of St. David's Presbyterian Church Sunday School, a member of the Seaton and the Masonic Lodge. He is married and has two children, Larry 10 and Margaret 8.

Hughes Cleaver, MP, the sitting member spoke briefly, expressing thanks to his constituents for their support and confidence during his years in office. A resolution was endorsed by the meeting to be sent to the Prime Minister "that in recognition of the long and outstanding service in government, Hughes Cleaver, the present member for Halton, be appointed to the Senate."

Hon. Walter Harris, Minister of Immigration and Citizenship was the special speaker. In dealing with the government's promise of 1949 in the light of what has been accomplished — he said "no other party could undertake a program such as ours, compare results, and go to the people with as contented a mind." He cited how exports had increased from \$3 billion in 1949 to over \$4 billion, and how unemployment was less than at any time. He said that more Canadian goods were going abroad than at any time in our history.

Fifty Acres Burned Stubborn Brush Fire

An estimated fifty acres of bushland have been burned in a fire which has been burning for 10 days at Terra Cotta.

The fire started on the Clancy property, then spread to land owned by Vern Thompson and Mrs. Elsie McBride. On Monday night, with many residents out fighting the fire Mrs. McBride's house on the Martin Estate was threatened and Erin Fire Brigade was called to stand by to protect the house.

No serious damage has been done yet. The fire has not been intense enough to burn large trees, but it has destroyed a number of young trees and shrubbery.

HARLEY-KAY EMPLOYEE THIRTY YEARS AGO

Employed here thirty years ago as a machinist at the Harley-Kay plant, Edward Allan Feller, 69, died suddenly at Port Hope Hospital Thursday.

The youngest son of James Feller and Maria Holley, he was born at Leiston, Suffolk. He was a prisoner of war for three years in the first war. After leaving Georgetown, he lived in Pittsburgh, Pa. and Toronto, retiring a few years ago.

He leaves his wife, Elizabeth Spack, one daughter, Mrs. Harold Pollard and two grandchildren in Port Hope, and one brother Armin Feller, Georgetown Internment was in Port Hope Cemetery following the funeral service on Saturday.

Recently called as minister of Highway Tabernacle at Dansville, N.Y., Rev. E. R. Peterson has moved to the States.

They called a crane truck from Erin and there was some delay as everybody in Erin was at Stanley Park at the first which destroyed the pavilion. Eventually a large enough group of neighbors was on hand for the men to lift the tractor high enough for Mr. Burt to be pulled to safety.

He was treated by an Erin doctor for badly bruised legs, but was able to walk away under his own power after the ordeal.
