

Rev. Collin Todd Back St. John's Anniversary

At 'St. John's United Church on Sunday, both morning and evening services were in celebration of the 113th anniversary of the founding of the church in this community. It is a far cry back to 1839 and the saddle horse days of the itinerating preacher, travelling over a wide sparsely settled area, meeting with e small group of Christian people, probably in one of their homes, or the small school house, upholding and encouraging them in their Christian faith, accepting of their hospitality for a few days, then travelling on to help another group, all very reminiscent of the days of the disciples of old and of Paul and ethers, all full of zeal for the spreading of the gospel. Then would come the desire for a place of worship, and the willingness to merifice and a mind to work for such 'Thus would St. John's be built as a Methodist chapel, one of a number on a circuit, until in the union of 1925 it became part of the United Church of Canada, and as it grew, became a charge of itself, later to be named St. John's United Church

Down through all these years

there has been a long succession of faithful, carnest ministers, with many faithful followers, upholding and adding to the church. The most recent of these, the Rev R Collin Todd, BA, BD, now of Kitchener Street United Church Niagara Falls was the guest speaker for both services, and was welcomed and introduced by Rev. John M. Smith, the present pastor. Mr. Todd expressed great pleasure at this opportunity of returning to his former church and pulpit, congratulated the conpregation and Mr Smith on the continued growth and achievements of the church, and wished them much success in all future endeavours. He had intended speaking on Counting the Cost but after learning more during the week of the splendid growth of the Sunday School and the faithful work of its teachers and officers, he decided to pay tribute to the work of the ordinary Christians, and to encourage them in this sacrificing task.
