

**Former Norval Minister  
Now California Rector**

A former Norval minister, Rev. Harry Leigh-Pink is now rector of All Saints Church, Long Beach, California.

Mr. Leigh Pink preceded Rev. J. Maxwell as rector of the Anglican churches at Norval, Stewartown and Hornby, went from here to Grand Rapids, Michigan and later became chaplain of the Navy Family Chapel at Long Beach.

A picture of the \$60,000 parish house which was built for the church last year was sent us recently by Mrs. Mary Bedell of San Diego who noticed it in one of the local papers. The parish house has an auditorium which seats 200, a fine stage, guild rooms and kitchen. It is joined to the church by a landscaped walk through a landscaped patio. Also included in the building are a rector's study and classrooms.

Progress of the parish is noted in the fact that when the retiring rector, Rev. Frederick Martyr became vicar in 1928, church services were held in an abandoned Methodist church building. In 1928, All Saints was admitted to the diocese as a parish and in 1929 the new church was built.

The W.A. meeting was held at Mrs. C. Smith's home. As the Guild are holding their bazaar Saturday, no W.A. meeting will be held this week.

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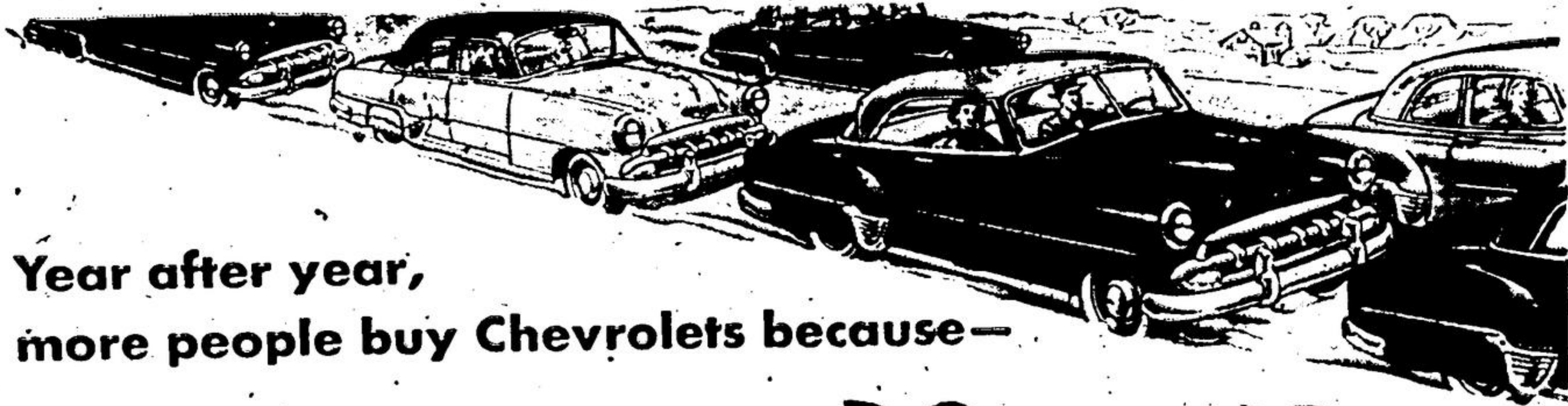
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**LEGION NOTES**
