Two Hundred Increase in Telephone Subscribers

The new who's who of the telephone world is out this week. It's the 1952 Georgetown directory, fresh off the presses and bound in a buff cover which distinguishes it from last year's green-covered book. Copies were delivered through the mail to subscribers this week.

W. O. Misener, Bell Telephone manager for this region, points out that the book contains 2,910 new and changed listings. Because of this, he urges subscribers to check any personal lists of telephone numbers they may have compiled against the numbers listed in the new book. Other suggestions to help subscribers get the best possible service from their telephones are included in the directory. In addition, there is a list of typical long distance rates.

Besides the Georgetown exchange, the directory lists subscribers in Brampton, Orangeville, Shelburne, Milton and the surrounding territory.

An indication of the growth of this region is seen in the fact that it was necessary to print 8,850 copies of this year's directory to supply subscribers, compared with 8,675 copies of the 1951 book.

The local directory is one of 50 the Bell Company publishes annually to supply subscribers throughout its Ontario-Quebec territory. These books are issued on a year-round basis at the rate of about one a week. This means that production — order taking, compiling, printing, proofreading, binding and delivery, — goes on continuously.

In all, more than 2,700,000 individual copies are required to supply all of the company's subscribers. These books contain a total of almost 2,000,000,000 pages which are manufactured from about 2,700 tons of paper.

Today's directories are a far cry from the first issued in Canada (and probably in the British Empire) in 1878. Distributed to subscribers of the Hamilton District Telegraph Company, they each consisted of a single sheet, 18x5 1/2 inches, and contained the names of 68 subscribers.

FARM NEWS

NIGHT SCHOOL WILL HAVE "FULL HOUSE"

The popularity of the "Halton Night School" classes continues to grow. All sections of the county, rural and urban alike, are represented in the 470 applications received to date, states Mrs. Velma Norris, secretary of the Planning Committee. It is expected that all of the courses with the exception of "Drama" will be arranged. In order to accomplish this, it has been necessary for the Committee in charge to transfer many of the applicants to the course of their second choice. In a number of courses twice as many applications were received as could be accepted. As intimated in the announcement, preference in such courses has been given to those who had not taken the course in a previous year. The only courses in which addi-

tional applicants can still be accommodated are as follows: Soil and Crops; Farm Management; Horse Gardening; Household Mechanics; Home Building. Practically all available hall accommodation in the county town has been secured in order to cope with the demand. It also involves lining up a staff of 30 teachers or instructors, the securing of which is no small task under present day conditions.
