Sermon Series Concludes On "The Way of Love"

On Sunday morning at St. John's United Church Rev. John M. Smith gave the last of his series of sermons on "The way of faith," "The way of hope," "The way of love" and used the familiar 1st Corinthians Chapter 13, as his scripture lesson, teaching that "Now abideth these three, Faith, Hope, Love; but the greatest of these is love." Along with this verse, Mr. Smith used as his text the answer of Jesus to the questioning scribe: "Thou shalt love the Lord Thy God with all thy heart, and with all thy soul and with all thy mind and with all thy strength; and thy neighbour as thyself."

Faith, Hope, Love, all three are necessary foundations of our Christian belief and doctrine, but as the apostle Paul wrote: "The greatest of these is love." Not the kind of love which attracts us to something or someone, and causes us to seek to possess for ourselves, probably the kind we are most used to associate with the word love, but rather the self-forgetting, self-giving

kind, most familiar to us in mother love poured on a child most needing a mother's love and care. Such a love is a truly basic quality which a Christian must possess, just as God is Love, created and sustains us in love and is seeking to reconcile us back to Himself by His great love in sending His only begotten Son, Jesus, love so great that He gave His best.

The Christian's life should be self-giving, not getting for self, giving for others, loving our neighbour as ourself. It is recorded of John, the youngest of the twelve disciples of Jesus, the quiet loving disciple, the last disciple living of those who had been close to Jesus himself, that in his feeble old age, those who knew him best, wished to have a last message from him, so had him carried to the front of their place of meeting and worship, and when the time came listened intently for the word he might give. It was simple yet profound "Little children, love one another."

Love is and should be Universal, speaks a language which is generally understood the world over, if given God's time to overcome the

fears and false teachings which are rampant in our world. What a different world this would be if our love could be so practiced that it would have its way.

To do this, love must be willing to go the second mile. The Roman law of Jesus' day compelled the Jew to go the first mile, and our code of today asks us to do that much as a duty, but the Christian love which God wishes us to possess, should cause us to do willingly and cheerfully, more than duty calls for, the self-giving second mile, the way of love. The burden may look heavy to others, but love makes it light enough to carry when we know it is our brother, the neighbour God asks us to love as ourselves.

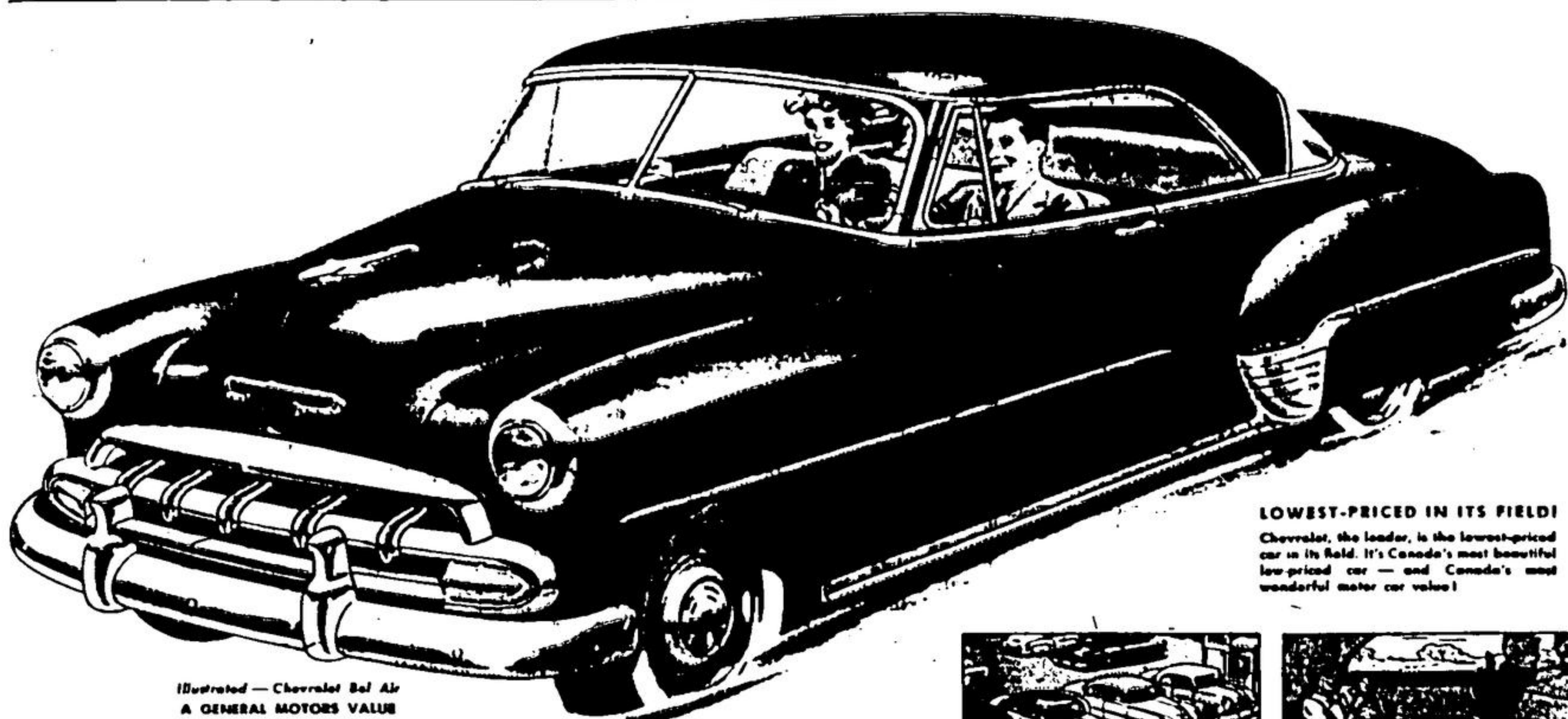

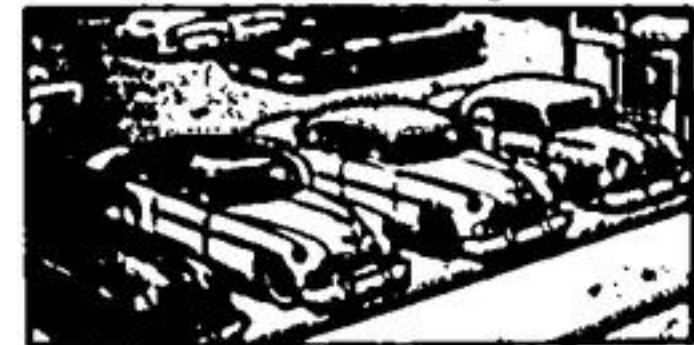

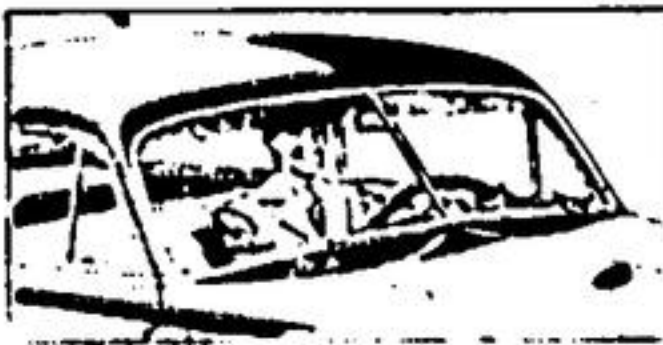
