**HOLSTEIN BREEDERS
AT WINTER FAIR**

The joint entry of A. G. Hunter
and A. M. Sherwood, Freeman was
the Reserve Junior Champion
Holstein bull at the Royal Winter
Fair. He is Hunterholm Rag Apple
Supreme who stood next to the
Junior Champion in the Senior
Yearling Bull Class. Mr. Hunter
also showed the fourth prize dry
aged cow and the sixth prize Sen-
ior Heifer Calf. He also showed the
6th prize Junior Get-of-Sire.

The joint entry of W. S. Hall, of
Oakville and J. E. Houck, Bram-
pton was third in the Junior Heifer
Calf Class while Mr. Hall alone
showed the fourth prize Junior Bull
Calf. Ashville Farms, Milton, had
the fourth prize milking three-
year-old and the 5th prize Progeny
of Dam.

Rockwood Rocket Tone, one of
the bulls in the Artificial Breeding
Unit of the Quinte District Cattle
Breeding Association, Belleville,
was Grand Champion at the Royal
for the second consecutive year. He
was bred by Rockwood Holsteins,
St. Norbert, Man., who also bred
and exhibited the Grand Champion
Female, Rockwood Beulah Pal
Rockette. This is the first time that
two Western Canada bred Holsteins
have won both Grands at the Royal
and is the first Royal Grand Cham-
pionship to go to the West since
1933. Both sired by Houckholme
Sovereign Sky Rocket and this is
the first time any bull has sired
both Grand Champions at the Royal.
He also had the winning Get.

The Reserve Grand Champion bull
was shown by H. C. McCloskey, of
Queensville, and the Reserve Grand
Champion Cow by Dr. Hector I. As-
tengo of Rosafe Farm, Brampton.
Dr. Astengo was the premier breed-
er and premier exhibitor of the
show with J. M. Fraser, Streets-
ville as runner-up. Fraser had the
Junior Champion female and W. D.
Shore, Glanworth, the Reserve Ju-
nior. Hardy Shore and H. C. Holt-
by and Son, Glanworth were joint
owners of the Junior Champion
bull.
