

Six Handsome Windows Gifts to Local Church

An overflow congregation gathered at St. John's United Church on Sunday morning to join in a service of dedication and praise, the special occasion being the unveiling and dedication of stained glass windows, placed in memory of loved ones, the gifts of three members of the church.

The windows on the West Side were the gift of Mrs. J. W. Kennedy and the Memorial Plaque was unveiled by her grandson, Mr. John David Stephens. The windows were dedicated by Rev. John M. Smith: "To the Glory of God, and in loving memory of J. W. Kennedy and family."

The windows in the vestibules were the gift of Mrs. Martin Near, and the Memorial Plaque was unveiled by Mr. Robert Shortill. The windows were dedicated by Rev. John M. Smith: "To the Glory of God and in loving memory of Martin L. Near."

The windows on the East Side were the gift of Leroy Dale, Q.C., and the Memorial Plaque was unveiled by James Allan Gardner, great grandson of the late Mr. and Mrs. J. C. Dale. The windows were dedicated by Rev. John M. Smith: "To the Glory of God and in loving memory of James Clapham Dale, and his beloved wife, Cecelia Lily VanKleeck."

Many relatives and friends from out of town: The Mayor and Mrs. Armstrong for the town and community joined with the congregation in paying grateful respect to these men and women who had done so much to promote the welfare of the church and the community.

The Kennedy family have long been associated with the church, Mr. Kennedy serving for a long period as Sunday School superintendent and Elder (also taking a very active interest in all matters pertaining to the well-being of the town).

Mr. Martin L. Near was also keenly interested in the work of the church, serving as Elder, and he too served the town and community faithfully and well.

Mr. and Mrs. J. C. Dale were not within this church fellowship but served the church at Madoc where both are gratefully remembered and where Mr. Dale

served as Sunday School superintendent for 40 years. Mrs. Dale served faithfully in various church organizations. Mr. Leroy Dale, their son, has been greatly interested in all the activities of this town for over a quarter century and was the first mayor when Georgetown became a town.

Rev. John M. Smith thanked the donors for their gifts and for the added beauty they gave to the church building, but probably the greatest value of the gifts would be the greater inspiration they would give all, to dedicate ourselves more fully to the real service and task of the church.

Mr. Smith in his meditation spoke on "Symbolism in the church" showing that the use of symbols was a way used largely by Jesus, showing His wisdom, because through them, his hearers could grasp the deep meaning of His teaching. "I am the vine, ye are the branches," said Jesus. "A branch can only bear fruit as it abides in the vine." This they understood, because vineyards were all around them. The bread and wine was another symbol used by Jesus to convey great truths, "I am the bread of Life," your sustainer. This bread is a symbol of My Body broken for you, the wine a symbol of My Blood poured out for your redemption, symbols the church has never forgotten. Mr. Smith asked that we

learn the symbols of the windows so well, that we would be able to tell them to newcomers to our midst and to our children as they grow up.

His children's story, The Saint, told of a teacher asking her class what a saint was. A very young boy showed a great eagerness to answer so she let him. His answer was "A saint is one who lets the light shine through." She asked him how he had learned that. His reply "in our church there is a saint in one of the windows and I have often seen him, letting the light shine through him."

He was very close, all he needed was a few more words. A saint is one who lets the light of Jesus' love shine through his life.

Choir anthem was "Let Mount Zion rejoice." Robert McCaul sang very appropriately "How lovely are Thy Dwellings."

At the evening service, young people's week got off to a very auspicious start with the choir left filled with the girls of Georgetown High School Choir, two young men of the Young People's Fellowship in the pulpit with the minister and a large number of young people in the audience. The two young men, Bill Whitney and Bill Hardman, took their part in the service exceptionally well, the choir under the leadership of Ken Harrison led the service of praise enthusiastically, rendering two anthems with a beautiful solo by Eleanor Schenk "Lord, let me live today." Mrs. Evans was at the organ.

Rev. J. M. Smith gave a strong challenging message to the Young People which should help them choose wisely and well their vocation in life. His advice was based on three words — Perspective, Participate and Power. Get your

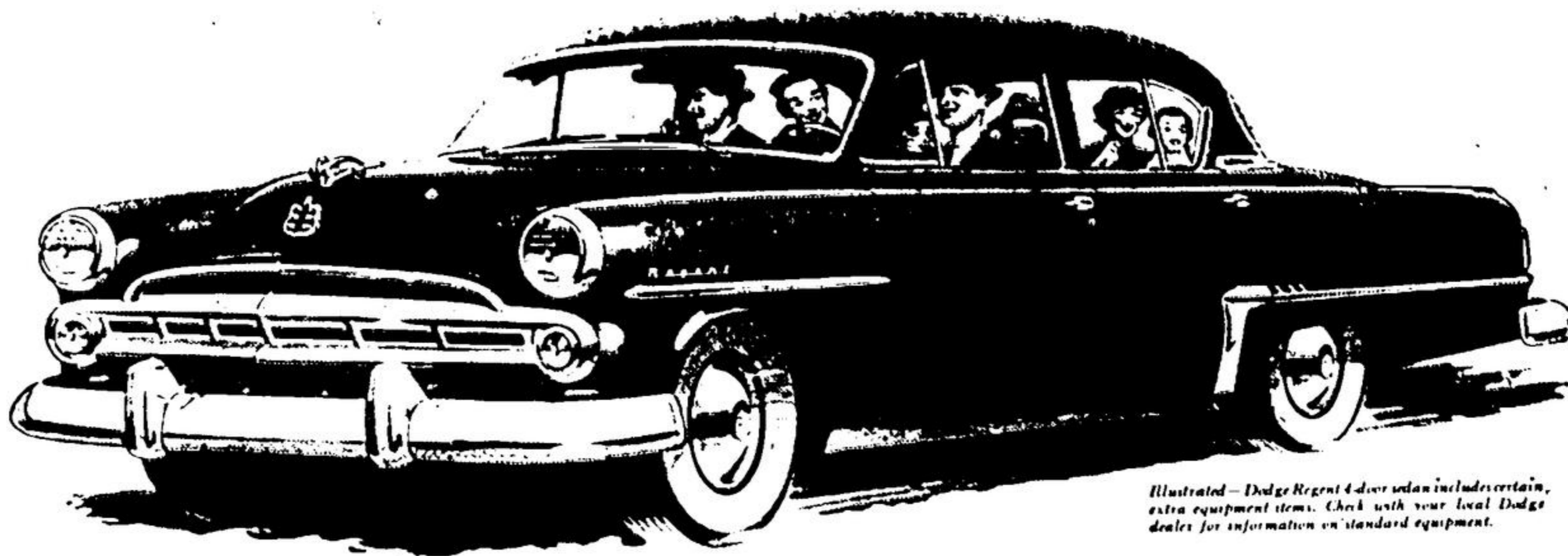

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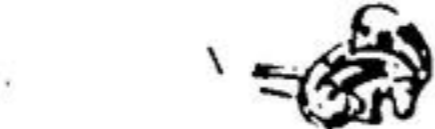
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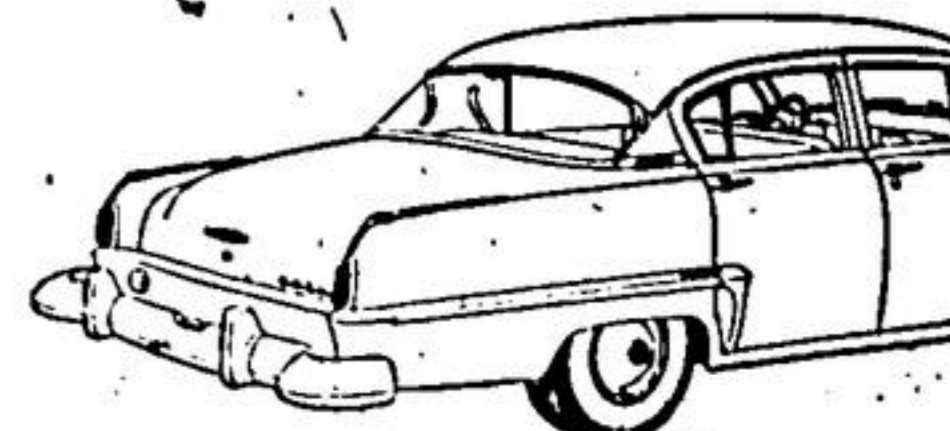
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
