What Council Did

ON MONDAY, DECEMBER 12

Will ingtal a 15" storm sewer from the Elm Street-Ontario Street corner to the creek to take care of drainage from the new Smith and Stone plant.

Mr. John Bell interviewed council about this and explained that Smith & Stone will be taking the sewer to that point.

Mr. Bell also repeated his report given at comination meeting about the stand the Dep't. of Education had taken in reducing the proposed high school building program in North Halton by eliminating several rooms in the Georgetown school and refusing cym-susitoriums in all schools. He asked council for any suggestions they might have about the changed picture.

Will ask Provincial Paper, Ltd. to pay for a portion of new sidewalk on Caroline Street (estimated cost about \$100) which had prevlously been agreed to by word of mouth by the company.

Were thanked by Georgetown Fair Board for the good maps of the grounds on fair day and the work of the town foreman at that

Heard a final report from dog tax collector W. O. Brownridge about collections, and were told that a few people would be prosecuted for failure to procure tags

Mr Brownridge said that he objected to dogs running at large (or the greater part of the year and was considering getting up a petition to have dogs tied up from April 1st to the end of November.

Will float two debenture issues totalling \$82,300 to meet capital costs

incurred by the town. A \$9300 issue , 5%, 20 years will pay the balance of construction costs of the new Howard Wrigglesworth

A \$73,000 issue. 5%, 10 years, will pay for \$12,000 sidewalk construction, \$55,650 pavement and \$5,000 sewer extensions. Both debentures will be issued as of January 1st and tenders are called by December 15th.

Following a severe stroke on Wednesday, John Given, 88, died on Friday morning at his farm home in Erin Township, lot 6, concession

Mr. Given was a life-long resident of the township where he was born on the 9th Line. When he was a baby his parents moved to the present farm which he took over after his father's death. He was one of thirteen children of John Given and Mary Ann Kirkwood, both of whom were born in Ireland at Ballaghmeanie near Belfast.

A farmer all his life, Mr. Given never married. His niece, Miss Janie Given has kept house for him many years. He was a member of Ballinafad United Church. He had been in failing health since suffering a stroke five years ago.
