What Council Did

ON MONDAY, DECEMBER 1st

Will install a 15" storm sewer from the Elm Street-Ontario Street corner to the creek to take care of drainage from the new Smith and Stone plant.

Mr. John Bell interviewed council about this and explained that Smith & Stone will be taking the sewer to that point.

Mr. Bell also repeated his report given at combination meeting about the stand the Dept. of Education had taken in reducing the proposed high school building program in North Halton by eliminating several rooms in the Georgetown school and refusing gym-natoriums in all schools. He asked council for any suggestions they might have about the changed picture.

Will ask Provincial Paper, Ltd. to pay for a portion of new sidewalk on Caroline Street (estimated cost about \$100) which had previously been agreed to by word of mouth by the company.

Were thanked by Georgetown Fair Board for the good shape of the grounds on fair day and the work of the town foreman at that time.

Heard a final report from dog tax collector W. O. Brownridge about collections, and were told that a few people would be prosecuted for failure to procure tags.

Mr. Brownridge said that he objected to dogs running at large for the greater part of the year and was considering getting up a petition to have dogs tied up from April 1st to the end of November.

Will float two debenture issues totalling \$82,300 to meet capital costs incurred by the town.

A \$9300 issue, 5%, 20 years will pay the balance of construction costs of the new Howard Wrigglesworth School.

A \$73,000 issue, 5%, 10 years, will pay for \$12,000 sidewalk construction, \$55,650 pavement and \$5,000 sewer extensions. Both debentures will be issued as of January 1st and tenders are called by December 15th.

Farmed in Erin John Given Dies

Following a severe stroke on Wednesday, John Given, 88, died on Friday morning at his farm home in Erin Township, lot 6, concession 6.

Mr. Given was a life-long resident of the township where he was born on the 9th Line. When he was a baby his parents moved to the present farm which he took over after his father's death. He was one of thirteen children of John Given and Mary Ann Kirkwood, both of whom were born in Ireland at Bal-lagheanie near Belfast.

A farmer all his life, Mr. Given never married. His niece, Miss Janie Given has kept house for him many years. He was a member of Ballinacred United Church. He had been in failing health since suffering a stroke five years ago.

Surviving are three brothers and one sister, Robert of Glen Williams, Mrs. M. K. Hardie (Maria Jane) of Toronto, Malcolm, Dellale, Saskatchewan and Marcus of Rockwood. Mr. and Mrs. Malcolm Given flew from the west on Saturday to attend the funeral service on Monday.

Mr. William Gibb, minister of Ballinacred United Church, conducted the service at the Rumley Funeral Home, Acton, which was followed by interment in Greenwood Cemetery, Georgetown. Pallbearers were nephews, Fred, Joe, Lloyd, John and Thomas Given and Clarence Snow. Great-nephews acted as flower bearers, Donald Thompson, John and Will Bradley, Bruce Given, and Elwood and Sam Snow.

PLAN FORMATION OF HOME & SCHOOL CLUB

Plans are being made to organize a Home and School Association in Georgetown which will have a membership of any parents of children at either of the two Georgetown public schools.

Principal Harold Henry of the old school and Principal William Kinrade of the Wrigglesworth School are both very much interested in the project and are assembling information which will be of value for the initial organization.

It is planned to have a public meeting in January when an official organizer will address the meeting, telling how such an association operates, and at which an executive will be chosen.

Home and School associations are particularly necessary nowadays, it is felt, with modern educational methods demanding a closer cooperation between the home and the school than ever before. Most cities and many towns already have thriving groups which belong to a provincial organization and it will mark a forward step in local education.
