**X-Ray Only Perfect Way
To Find T.B.: Dr. Bull**

Out of a million Canadian recruits
x-rayed during the first four years
of the war, 3,300 were found to have
active cases of tuberculosis, says Dr.
Bull, Medical Officer of Health and
Director for Halton County.

Dr. Bull made this statement in
connection with the free x-ray of all
Halton to be given in Georgetown
December 16 and 17 sponsored by the
Halton County Tuberculosis & Health
Association in cooperation with the
Ontario Tuberculosis Association and
the Ontario Department of Health.

Thousands of workers in war in-
dustries were also x-rayed. Dr. Bull
explained, and many cases of active
tuberculosis found among people
who looked perfectly robust.

"Some people ask why we go to the
trouble and expense of finding
cases of tuberculosis when the people
concerned are not ill," continued
Dr. Bull. "The answer is sim-
ply that long before the disease
makes anyone visibly ill, disease
germs can be given to other people.
Every case of tuberculosis comes
from someone else."

"That is the argument for care-
fully searching for the disease, and
on the part of the person affected
with the disease, there is untold ad-
vantage in discovering it early. In
its early stages it is the most cur-
able of all the serious diseases."

"There are still a lot of people
who claim to be able to recognize
a 'TB look,' said Dr. Bull. 'Altho'
in some advanced cases there are
certain symptoms quite easily de-
tected, even the most able special-
ists do not attempt to diagnose a
case without the aid of an x-ray,"
he continued.

Early discovery and prompt treat-
ment of tuberculosis reduces the
problem of re-employment, for it
enables the person to go back to
his job, whereas advanced cases
are more likely to cause permanent
disability. Dr. Bull pointed out
