#### Dr. Mitchell Addresses Halton Dairy Herdsmen

Dr. William Mitchell, V.S., formerly of the Halton Health Unit and now of the Ontario Veterinary College was the special speaker at the monthly meeting of Halton Junior Herdsmen.

It will be of interest to learn that a new experiment is being tried in Halton. Earlier in the year Halton was selected to try out a new project before passing it on to other parts of the province. The project in question is open to young men 18 to 25 years inclusive, and involves the keeping of records of production, feed records, etc. and also the young men are being given a rather diversified course in such subjects as Farm Organization; Feeding and Management of Dairy Cattle; Stable Arrangements; Health of Livestock, etc., etc. The project which is to cover a period of two years will also include visits to various farms and institutions. The group on Thursday of this week are guests of the Ontario Agricultural and Veterinary Colleges in Guelph.

The young men participating in this expérimental project include Don Matthews and Fyfe Somerville of Acton; Frazer McNubb, Georgetown, Don Joyce, Colin Marshall, Clarence Ford Jr., Sam Harrop, John Stark, and Robt.
