80th Birthday for Old Lacrosse Star

Samuel McClure, a resident of this district all his life and a veteran of the famous old Excelsior lacrosse teams of the 1890's, celebrated his 80th birthday at his home, 244 Main Street North, Brampton, last week.

Mr. and Mrs. McClure were hosts to their friends during the afternoon and in the evening Mr. McClure was honoured guest at a birthday party tendered him by his wife, two sons, Oliver and Bruce and their families. He has seven grandchildren.

Mr. McClure farmed in his youth and younger years on the McClure farm, first line west. On his retirement he moved to Brampton. An ardent sportsman, he participated in all branches of athletics in his youth. His first game of lacrosse was under the Excelsior banner was played in 1890 with the Brampton Juniors in Milton. He played senior in the early 90's and was a member of the championship team of 1894 which was sprinkled with famous lacrosse names such as the Peaker Brothers, J. R. Falls and W. H. Kelly. The 1894 team defeated Orillia for the championship. Mr. McClure wound up his lacrosse career with Brampton in 1901 in a game at the Island against Markham.

Ontario Exhibits Sweep Chicago Show

Maintaining the standards set in other years, Ontario growers again made more than a creditable showing at the International Grain and Hay Show at Chicago.

Some 67 exhibits in 17 classes captured no less than 58 prizes including 2 championships and two reserve championships.

Murray W. Coverdale, Cayuga, won the alfalfa championship, Gustav Stein, Matheson, took top honours in the Pea classes, with Wm. M. Lansdell, Brampton, winning reserve championship in the same division. Hubert D. Owen, Electric, Ont., won reserve honours in the Soybean classes.

Ontario growers won 9 first prizes as follows:

Small yellow peas: Gustav Stein, Matheson; Large yellow peas, Wm. M. Lansdell, Brampton; Soybeans, Region No. 1 and 2: Hubert D. Owen, Electric; Red Clover, John Hagarty & Son, Alma; Timothy, R. Bernard, Bourget; Alfalfa, Murray W. Coverdale, Cayuga; Yellow Dent Corn, Region 1: John Mickle, Wallaceburg; White Dent Corn, Region 1 and 2: Wm. R. Beattie, Staples, R. R. 1; Junior Corn, Region 1, Wayne Giles, Christina.

In addition to regular prize money each of these 9 exhibitors is entitled to \$15.00, offered by the Ontario Department of Agriculture, to each exhibitor winning a first prize.

Ontario growers made a clean sweep of the Yellow Corn class (region 1) taking no less than 13 top placings.

Region 1 includes most of Canada and the States bordering Canada, with the exception of the southern parts of Minnesota, Wisconsin, Michigan and New York.

Region 2 includes Essex County, the southern part of South Dakota, Minnesota, Michigan, Wisconsin and New York and Pennsylvania.

The top six prizes in Soybeans (Region 1), 5 tops in Red Clover and four of the first five placings in Timothy were all awarded to Ontario growers.
