**Canadian Holsteins
Champs at Chilean
National Show**

Holsteins of Canadian breeding
won many of the top awards at the
Chilean National Exposition held at
Santiago, Chile. Over 300 Holsteins
of the North American type were
shown.

According to Judge J. Homer
Remsberg, Middleton, Maryland,
two Canadian bred cows dominated
the female section of the show.
These stood first and second in the
Aged Cow class and went through
to the Grand and Reserve Grand
Championships. The Grand Cham-
pionship went to Silver Hall Maud,
bred by T. E. Kelley, Schomberg,
and exported to Chile by Orvan
Chambers, Wilfrid, Ont. in 1949.
She is a daughter of Lonelm Rag
Apple Highmar. The Reserve
Grand Champion was Maple Lea L.
G. Mirapda, bred by L. B. Reid,
Ripley, and exported to Chile in
1930 by International Livestock Ex-
porters, Oakville. This cow is a
daughter of Keendale Lodge Loch-
invar.

The Grand Champion bull was the
winning aged bull, Carnation En-
sign Magic Dekal, bred by Carna-
tion Milk Farms, Seattle, Washing-
ton. Next to him in class was a
son of Markman, Glenafon Rag
Apple Signet bred by J. J. E. Mc-
Cague, Alliston. A daughter of Sig-
net was the first prize Senior
Yearling and Junior Champion fe-
male of the show.

The first prize three-year-old
bull and Reserve Grand Champion
was a son of the noted Glenafon
Rag Apple Alert bred by J. J. E.
McCague, Alliston, and jointly
shown by McCague and R. H. Mc-
Ilquham, Lanark.

The Junior Champion bull was a
Chilean bred son of the noted XXX
bull Sonnwilk Sovereign who was
bred by Amos Wilkinson, Walle-
stein, Ont. and shipped to Chile by
J. R. Henderson, Kingston. Judge
Remsberg commented on the high
standing of the Sonnwilk Sovereign
progeny throughout the show.

Both Grand Champions were own-
ed by Jose Barros Hurtado, pres-
ident of the Chilean Holstein-Fries-
ian Association.

**Royal Bank Sets New High
Canadian Banking Record**

Figures shown in the Royal Bank
of Canada's 1952 annual statement
just issued, again set new high re-
cords in the history of Canadian
banking, remarkable gains having
been achieved in a number of sig-
nificant areas of the bank's busi-
ness. Total assets gained by more
than \$175 million to reach a total
of \$2,691,456,874, which is over
double the figure of ten years ago.

Total deposits also show a no-
table increase over the record fig-
ures of a year ago. Commercial
loans are at the highest point in the
history of the bank, reflecting the
steadily increasing tempo of Cana-
dian business and industry during
the past year.

Deposits have now reached the
impressive total of \$2,527,510,437.
This represents an increase of well
over \$177 million for the year and
a new high mark for Canadian
banking. Interest bearing deposits
by the public again increased sub-
stantially, the 1952 figure being
\$76,061,082 over the record of a
year ago. The total under this
heading now stands at \$1,190,784,873
almost three times the figure of ten
years ago. Public deposits not bear-
ing interest rose by \$99,810,044, to
reach a total of \$1,183,527,247.

The statement reveals total loans
of \$982,177,916, a new high figure
for Canadian banking and an in-
crease of \$134,157,088 over the figure
for 1951. Commercial loans in Cana-
da now stand at \$719,010,194, an
increase of \$96,727,467 for the year.
Call and short loans in Canada gal-
luned by \$8,471,306 in 1952, and simi-
lar loans elsewhere than in Canada
increased by \$31,231,236.

Cash assets total \$534,087,603 which
is equivalent to 20.5 per cent of the
bank's public liabilities. Liquid as-
sets amount to \$1,710,921,629 which
is equal to 65.6 per cent of the
bank's liabilities to the public in-
cluded in this liquid assets are
Dominion and Provincial govern-
ment securities totalling \$851,968,002.

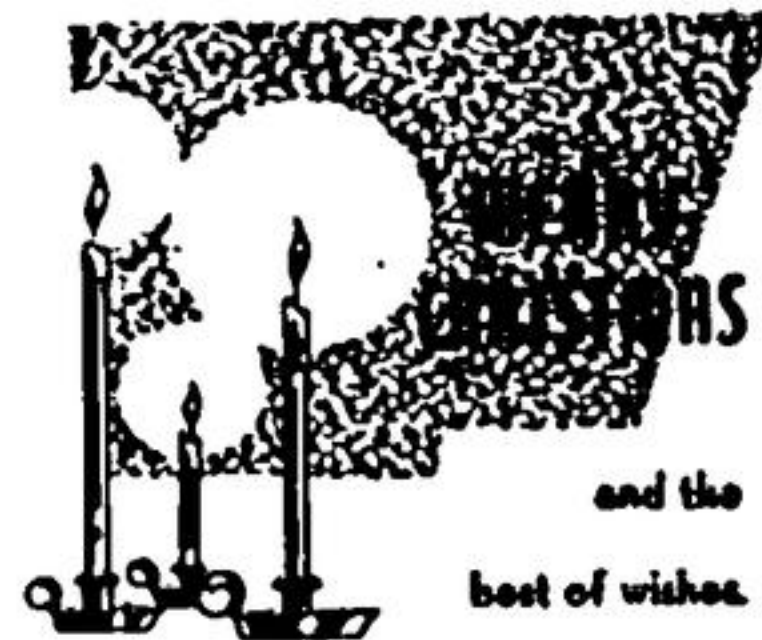
