\$86,000 Bond Issue Sells Above Par

Two issues of town debentures, totalling \$86,300 have been bought by the Toronto bond firm of Nesbitt, Thomson & Co.

The bonds, which will bear an interest rate of 5 per cent brought slightly over par from the company, which was one of ten which submitted tenders. Three of the bids were over par and the rest only slightly under, which speaks well for the financial position of the town which already has a substantial debenture debt.

The issues, which will bear a January issue date consist of \$77,000 in ten year debentures, for road, sewer and sidewalk construction, and \$9,300 for excess cost of the new Howard Wrigglesworth school.

Find Esqueving Farmer Dead at His Home

DUNCAN MILL MANAGER HERE DR. HOOVER TO THOROLD

Ross Duncan, superintendent of the Georgetown Division of Provincial Paper, Ltd. for four years, has been promoted to general superintendent.

He succeeds Dr. G. I. Hoover, manager here since 1948, who becomes manager of the Thorold division. The appointments, effective December 23, were announced last week by Mr. H. O'Leary, general manager of Provincial Paper, Ltd.

Mr. Duncan, Georgetown-born, is the son of Mrs. C. R. Scott of Hamilton and the late Angus Duncan. His father was master mechanic at the mill from 1917 until his untimely death in 1936 when he was killed in an accident at the mill.

Educated in Georgetown public and high schools, he was attending the University of Toronto, studying chemical engineering at the time of his father's death. In 1937 he started work for the machine shop

Georgetown's new clerk-treasurer and collector of tax and water rates is John D. Kelly.

One of eight who applied for the position being vacated by Charles Willson, clerk for the past five years, Mr. Kelly was hired by council at a meeting called for the purpose on Monday.

Mr. Kelly will assume his new position on January 1st. He recently retired on pension after thirty years' service with Provincial Paper, Ltd., for 27 of which he was office manager at the old "lower mill" until it was closed down three years ago.

Mr. Kelly came to Georgetown after six years in the Orient where he served with the American army and later was employed with an oil company. He has played an active part in town affairs, serving a four year term on council several years ago and as a member of the public school board for seventeen years. He was relief administrator for five years during the depression and during the war was an official of various Victory Loan drives.

He is a past president of Branch 120, Canadian Legion, past president of the Lions Club and has held high offices in the two local Masonic lodges. At present he is treasurer of Halton Chapter and an auditor of Credit Lodge. He is a thirty-second degree Mason.

School Plans Progress Board Hires Architects

Architects for several Ontario high schools which have been constructed in the last few years, Barnett & Rieder have been engaged by North Halton high school district board to engineer the building program which will be undertaken next year.

The Toronto and Kitchener firm, which also has offices at Port Hope and Clarkson, will prepare plans for a new 7-room school at Acton, a 4-room addition to the Georgetown school and a one-room addition at Milton. The \$350,000 building program will be geared to provide the new accommodation for the school year commencing in September, 1954.

Barnett & Rieder were one of two firms which were asked to meet the school board on Monday in Stewarville. Both firms showed pictures of schools which they had planned and outlined the service they could offer in designing the schools.

Among high schools already built or under construction which were designed by the firm are Mount Forest, Dundalk, Kincardine, Shelburne and Arthur, as well as additions at Port Elgin and Hanover.
