FARM NEWS

Revolutionary Methods Increase Corn Yield

High grain corn yields in Ontario are normally associated with southwestern · Ontario. Yesterday, however, we had a chat with Sam Newell, who operates around 150 acres on the Wentworth side of the Town Line near Millgrove.

During the past two or three years we have heard reports of high yields of grain corn on the Newell farm, and rather revolutionary methods being practiced by Sam. So much so that we had definitely planned this past summer to pay him a visit. However, it was another case of plans which didn't materialize. Yesterday, however, we got at least part of the story.

and to say the least, we are amazed. As everyone knows, the summer of 1952 was a dry year. Despite this, Sam informs us his 65 acres of grain corn averaged 74 bus. of shelled corn per acre. What to us is even more startling, two-thirds of the acreage was in corn for the fifth consecutive year, and the remaining twenty-odd acres in corn for the fourth consecutive year. Sam describes his farm as very rolling and ranging from blow sand in spots to black loam in the

valleys and gravelly on the knolls. Here in Halton on our heavier clay loams the recognized sound procedure is to fall plow. Most of us feel that fall plowing is practically year are to be worth while, How-The Legion party, for children 10 ever, Sam has a different soil type and furthermore, it is normally the first of December or even later before he gets his corn picked. Consequently, for the past three years at least, he has practiced the spring plowing.

The first operation is to run a shredder over the refuse of the previous corn crop. This chops or shreds the corn stalks into a condition which makes plowing much casier. Prior to plowing however, he spreads 400 lbs. of 0-12-20 commercial fertilizer over each acre, Ammonium Nitrate (32 per cent plus another 100 lbs. per acre of Nitrogen). In other words he plows in 500 lbs. per acre of commercial fertilizer containing 32 lbs. of Nitrogen - 48 lbs. of Phosphorus, and 80 lbs. of Potassium. Then at planting time and by the way he uses a corn planter, he side dresses with another 200 lbs. per acre of 4-12-10. Then along about the last cultivation, when the corn is about a foot high or better, he side dresses again with 200 lbs. per acre of Ammonium Nitrate. That according to our mathematics totals 900 lbs., of fertilizer per acre in one season. or in terms of Nitrogen, Phosphorus and Potassium, means 72 lbs. Nitrogen, 72 lbs. Phosphorus, and 100 lbs. Potassium per acre. Yes, Sam also practices spraying with a chemical weed killer to control such annual weeds as lambs quarters, pigweed, etc.

The idea of growing corn year after year on the same land is contrary to all orthodox ideas. would normally anticipate that such procedure would burn all the organic matter and fibre out of the soil. How long this programme can continue, we do not know. On the face of it, it seems all wrong and yet Sam states his yields in recent years have been higher than a few years ago. At that time he was plowing down alfalfa. He also states that by leaving his corn stalks standing in the field over winter thereilis less' erosion than when he left it in grain stubble. In 1951 he had a 90 bus. per acre crop. His lower yield this year in his
