X-Ray Two Thousand At Free TB Clinic

People from Georgetown and district totalling 1580 were X-rayed at the Oddfellows Hall when the mobile government clinic spent two days here. An estimated total of 2000 had their X-ray during the visit.

The Georgetown visit was part of a county-wide project undertaken by Halton TB & Health Association. In Georgetown, Alex MacLaren was in charge and Mrs. J. L. Ellerby, aided by Women's Institutes and other groups, organized the surrounding township. Only rural point of call in the immediate district was a one-day stop at Hornby.

The clinic also was set up between the two paper mills, where about 250 Alliance and Provincial employees had their X-rays. Smith and

Stone had previously handled their own clinic for 500 employees. A visit was also made to Glen Williams for the benefit of Beaumont Knitting Mills employees and their families.

Success of the clinic locally can be attributed mainly to the tremendous amount of organization work which was undertaken by a large group of volunteers. Every household in town was visited and every canvasser turned in a complete report. Only sixty people of all those canvassed indicated their unwillingness to make use of this free service, most on grounds of illness or age. There were only a handful who could not realize the benefits to themselves and others which the clinic might bring.
