THERE HAVE been a lot of comments about the new tables. Everyone seems to think that they add something to the looks of the room upstairs.

Quite a flattering article appeared in the Toronto Star about the Legion-sponsored "kid" hockey. It was written by that well-known Georgetown boy, Gord Alcott, now of Weston, the original promotor of organized kid hockey in Georgetown. We suspect he got the raw material for the article from Denny Wright, his brother-in-law and an active member of the Legion hockey committee. The article reads as-fol-

KID HOCKEY WELL ORGANIZED Gordon Alcott

An important hockey meeting took place last month in Weston. The first meeting of the little NHL - a hockey organization that has pledged itself to give organized hockey to every boy in his community within the age group of 8 to 13 years - was held.

There-were representatives from Wallaceburg, St. Catharines, Georgetown, Weston, Midland, New Toronto, Scarboro and Port Hope. These eight centres are operating leagues for some 2,000 young boys. Little NHL is spreading, and it is encouraging to see men giving up their time for the furtherance of kids' hockey in Ontario.

Weston for example, has 24 teams in its midget NHL, comprising some 350 boys. Georgetown was the first Onterio.town to promote Little NHL away back in 1937, and they are

carrying on in the same fine way with the Canadian Legion sponser- --ing and operating the Georgetown Little NHL.

In its second year of sponsorship, the Legion is looking after 150 boys of the ages 8 to-13 years in the Little NHL, a midget and a juvenile team. Last year, the Georgetown jupeniles won the Ontario 'C' championship.

The kids' teams are divided into three groups: Junior A, American league and NHL, with 14 teams represented in all. The Georgetown Legion does not stop with its own Georgetown boys, but has enlarged its league to embrace boys from the neighbouring towns of Norval, Limehouse, Stewarttown and Glen Williams.

All hockey uniforms and goalkeeping equipment are provided. and the Georgetown Memorial arena supplies free-ice time every Saturday morning for four hours. At the end of the playing season, crests are awarded to the winning teams and a banquet is thrown for all players and coaches.

Alf Sykes is the league president, with Legion president Les Clark giving his full support. The coaches are Legion personnel and include Dennis Wright, Herb Arnold, Bud James. Tom Beckett. Nels Robinson. Pat Patterson, Nick Garvin, Frank Connely, Bill Collier, Gordy King. Jack Kelley, Rocky Lorusso, Bill Latimer and George Sargent. Pat Patterson, referee-in-chief of the OHA, is also the chief referee of the Georgetown Little NHL..

And while we're the subject, how about some of the chaps who are not working Saturday morning cropping down to give a hand at the arena. The boys are frightfully shorthanded these days, and could sure use more help. (Also it would he a good boost for juvenile morale to see a few spectators out to these games). How about it fellows?


