

What Council Did

ON MONDAY, JANUARY 19th

Appointed Dick Licata a member of the Board of Parks Management, replacing P. F. Blackburn, and re-appointed Fred Chapman for three year terms.

Re-appointed J. L. Lambert to a two-year term on the Public Library Board.

Granted permission to Gordon Colquhoun to build a house on a George Street lot which has 45 feet frontage.

The building by-law allows for such permission on lots under the standard of 50 feet where such lots existed prior to passing of the by-law.

Re-appointed Everett Cole and Mrs. W. E. Nodwell to the Cemetery Board for 2-year terms.

Appointed William Hyde as chief, Jack Harley deputy-chief and William Ritchie driver of the Fire Brigade.

Re-appointed Dr. J. B. Milne to a 2-year term on North Halton high school district board, and Walter Biehn to fill the unexpired term of John Bell who has resigned from the Board.

Named W. O. Brownridge as dog tax collector, with a fee of 25 per cent of fees collected.

Cr. Goodlet said he had been discussing the appointment with Mr. Brownridge and felt that this year he should have the full cooperation of council and police if he were to do the job successfully. Mayor Armstrong agreed and said it is often helpful if there is any trouble in collecting, to have a policeman call at the house as a reminder.

Norton — I don't like that. It smacks of Gestapo tactics to bring the police into it.

Armstrong — It's better to have them call with a reminder than with a summons.

Allen — After last year's dog tax campaign Mr. Brownridge may have some trouble finding the dogs, but I don't think he'll have much trouble collecting the tax once he finds them.

A discussion originated by Cr. Allen about why the Board of Parks did not look after the park, ended when the by-law establishing the board and the section of the Municipal Act under which it was created, were reviewed.

Allen — I'm confused about the board's title. No money is spent on the park. Why is it all spent on the Arena?

Goodlet — I think all the money shouldn't be spent in one place. The ball club wants \$100. Perhaps our council committee could meet with the board and see what could be done.

Mayor — When the town took over the arena in 1944 council studied the proper method of management and this seemed the proper one. The parks board were asked once about looking after the park, but felt they had enough on their hands with the arena. We are required to give them a mill of the tax rate and they can spend it as they see fit. We must remember that not one penny on the artificial ice debenture has been paid by the town.

Allen — This year we are faced with some expense at the park. We have done some good work with voluntary labour and it should be continued. We need toilets, a \$1700 wiring job. The Board of Parks get credit for anything done and yet they have no interest in it. If there's a mill grant there should be a stipulation that a percentage be spent on the park.

McGilvray — Last year was the first year the board, asked for their whole grant.

Mayor — We can't allot a sum of money and expect it to do two jobs where it did one before.

Allen — My only concern is that the Legion, Unions, Fire Brigade and other bodies won't donate their time to fixing up the park and find that their children will be charged admission. Who collects fees at the park?

Mayor — In almost every case, the park is given free to organizations. Only once can I remember an outside group paying a fee. In this case, the town received it.

Allen — The arena is only open to children whose parents have money. I don't want the park to become the same.

McGilvray — There are free skating periods.

Mayor — And free hockey Saturday mornings.

Sargent — The parks board statement should be in our interim statement.

Mayor — No board statement is included in this, but all are in the auditor's report and copies of this

are available each year.

Goodlet — Reading this by-law changes the whole picture. The by-laws says the Parks Board is only responsible for the arena. It is now up to council to do anything necessary at the park and there is no need for council meeting with the parks board.

Appointed a court of revision to hear appeals against the Local Improvement assessment for roads, sidewalks, and sewerage. Members are the mayor, reeve, deputy reeve and Crs. Allen and McGilvray.

Set the first Monday in each month as regular meeting for the council.

Because of a delay in meter-reading at the end of the year, will send the minimum bill to all water users in January. A man will be hired in June to read meters and in future all meters will be read by Dec. 1st and June 1st and bills sent a month later.

Granted substantial pay raises in town employees effective February 1st, which will increase the municipal payroll by \$4000 yearly.

New pay for salaried employees: (former pay in brackets) is: Town clerk \$3300 (\$2800); Assessor \$3000 (\$2470); Foreman \$3890 (\$3030); Assistant clerk \$1800 (\$1500); Caretaker \$864 (\$720).

Town employees have been graded into three categories, with rates of pay for a 48-hour week \$1.24, \$1.18 and \$1.12 respectively. Former rates were \$1.03 and 95c.

Appearing later in the meeting, W. O. Brownridge said he was undecided about taking on the job of dog tax collector until he found what the police intended to do about prosecuting last year's offenders. He recalled various cases where he did not feel the police had backed him up. Mr. A had bought a \$2 tag when he had a female dog. Mr. B had been called on seven times with still no tag bought. Mr. C has two dogs and only one tag. Mr. D has one tag for a female and 11 pups. Mr. E has one tag for 7 dogs, bought another after a visit from the corporal and still has 5 to go.

Mr. Brownridge urged council to pass a by-law like Brampton to keep dogs at home year-round and said he is considering getting up a petition to this effect if council does not take action.

Ken Giles President Halton County Liberals

Ken Giles of Nelson Township was elected president of the Halton County Liberal Association at the annual meeting held in Trafalgar Township Hall on Friday evening. He succeeds J. C. Cunningham of Hornby who has held the office for the past three years. In signifying his intention to contest the office, Mr. Giles said his time would be at the disposal of the Liberal party at all times and that he would work in their interests from now until the election was over because he was in accord with the policies of the Liberal party.

Other officers elected were: 1st vice pres.—Jack Kehoe, Burlington. 2nd vice pres.—Frank Petch, Georgetown. Secretary—Ken Dick, Milton. Treasurer—Victor Hall, Trafalgar. Halton's Liberal candidate, Mr. Murray McPhail, of Campbellville, addressed the meeting, reiterating some of the legislation put into effect by the Liberal party and their stand on national economies for the future. Hughes Cleaver, retiring MP, was also present and commented on the criticism now being levelled at the government in regards to the Currie report. He said that the amount of money involved was slightly less than \$50,000 and that the department handled transactions of over \$2,000,000 which would seem a small loss in comparison to the whole. He said practically all had been recovered and the dishonest person involved were serving jail sentences. "Even banks and other businesses lose money," said Mr. Cleaver, "and it is not unlikely that government branches could lose due to the dishonest practices of employees."
