Subsidy Paid on Nineteen Farm Ponds

Subsidies totalling \$1795 were recently paid on 19 farm ponds constructed in 1952 under the Halton Farm Pond Policy, states George Currie, chairman of the Halton Conservation Committee.

Since the Halton policy came into effect in March of last year, a total of 71 applications have been recei-Mr. Currie says that a total of 23 ponds, were constructed under, the policy, however, two of these have not yet been properly fenced to keep out livestock, and the other two require minor adjustments to bring them up to requirements.

It will be recalled that under the Halton policy, the county council and the Oht. Dept. of Agriculture contributed dollar for dollar wards the project, up to a maximum of \$1,000 each during , 1952. The Halton policy has received much favourable comment from various parts of the Province. Judging by the number of inquiries received by J. E. Whitelock, secretary of Halton Conservation Committee, several other counties are likely to follow Halton's lead in 1953. The Ontario Firefighters Association is also very much interested in Halton's policy from the viewpoint of adequate water for fire protection.

Dairymen Oppose Synthetic Products

Halton Holstein, Jersey and Guernsey breeders at their annual meetings all went on record as opposed to further encroachment of synthetic products in the dairy business.

During the past year synthetic dairy products have appeared on the market in a large percentage of the states to the south. In Texas, for example, an imitation ice cream in which the butter fat has been entirely replaced by vegetable oils, now represents 50 per cent of thetotal retail sales. It is also reportod in the same state, that research work is now in progress for making cheese from cottonseed oil. It is reported also that dairy operators and outside interests in the US ex pect to introduce vegetable oil substitutes for processed cheese, cream and fluid milk in the very near future. It is the consensus of opinion that this development will spread throughout the entire U.S. in the very near future,

In view of the important, place which the dairying industry holds in our economy, it seems hardly conceivable that some legislation will not be enacted to prevent further inroads by synthetic dairy products. Here is the resolution passed by all three Halton dairy breed organizations at their recent meetings:

"Resolved that We the Halton Holstein, Jersey and Guernsey breeder's, recommend that necessary steps be taken to present any further invasion of edible oils which threaten to undermine the dairy industry. We are in agreement with the resolution presented to the On-. tario Government by the Ontario Federation of Agriculture, namely: "This situation is so acute and the problem is of such importance to the dairy farmer and the whole economy that we would press for immediate legislation prohibiting the manufacture and sale of synthetic dairy products in Ontario."

Copies are being sent forward to Halton's provincial and federal mem_ bers; to the Minister of Agriculture for both Ontario and the Dominion, as well as to the various breed organizations and the Ontario Federation of Agriculture.

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
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
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
