Pickett North Halton School Board Chairman

CECIL WOOD SUCCEEDS PRINCIPAL MARELLUS

Nelson Pickett, Milton druggist, was named chairman of North Halton High School board at Monday's inaugural meeting in Milton. George Cleave, Esqueping, is vice-chairman.

Committees for 1953 were appointed as follows, the first named being chairman: Finance: George Cleave, Dr. J. B. Milne, Arthur Beaumont; Management: Walter Biehr, G. A. Dills, Ross Carbert; Transportation: C. E. Wood, Craig Reid, Georgetown; Property: George Brown, G. A. Dills, Dr. Carl Martin; Building: William Coon, Dr. Martin, Dr. Milne, Mr. Cleave, Mr. Carbert.

Principal J. E. Marcellus announced his resignation as principal of Milton High School to take effect the end of this term. Mr. Marcellus has spent almost forty of his 47 years in the teaching profession at Milton and it was with regret that the board learned of his decision to retire. He will be succeeded by the present vice principal, Cecil Wood.

Re-appointments of attendance officers were made — M. H. Moyer at Georgetown, Frank McNiven at Milton and Mr. Mason at Acton. The salary of secretary-treasurer Gordon Brown was increased to \$1300 plus a \$200 car allowance. Meetings were set for the third Monday in each month, with meetings alternating between the schools.

Principal Lambert reported that Georgetown is taking advantage of the new public school gym and at present two periods weekly are being held there. He spoke of the good record of Georgetown cadets who were placed second highest in the grouping for schools of similar size in this year's inspection.

The board was interviewed by parents of an Acton student who had been suspended for not complying with a detention imposed. Two Acton teachers also appeared before the board to discuss the matter. The secretary was instructed to notify the parents that the girl must comply with school discipline in order to continue her studies.
