Mr. Gibb read the report for the session stating the total membership for January 1st, 1952 was 101 - this had been reduced by one death and eight by Certificate, leaving the membership roll at 92. Of these 68 were resident and 24 non-resident, adherents, 40. There were 4 baptisms, 1 marriage and 2 burials. Mr. S. H. Lindsay and Mr. R. 
