

### Esquering Council

WEDNESDAY, JANUARY 28th

A special meeting was called to deal with tenders for fire equipment for the newly-formed Georgetown Fire District.

Investigating all angles of the question, it was found that the specifications originally given for tenders did not supply a heavy enough chassis for the use to which the truck will be put, and council decided to ask for further tenders on the equipment.

MONDAY, FEBRUARY 2nd  
Tenders were ordered for supplying approximately 15,000 cubic yards of gravel on township roads, with tenders to be in the hands of the road superintendent by noon, March 2nd.

Reeve George Leslie and Deputy Reeve Wilfrid Bird were named delegates to the convention of Ontario Rural Municipalities in Toronto on February 23rd and 24th.

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and a \$10 membership fee was paid to the association.

Township employees were given a 15c an hour pay increase, effective March 1st, and a by-law is being prepared increasing the salary of the road superintendent.

Appointments on Esquering Community Hall Board include: Reeve Leslie and Deputy Reeve Bird to represent the township; John Bird for Esquering Agricultural Society; Denney Charles, Federation of Agriculture; Howson Rudell, Junior Farmers; Mrs. Claude Pickett, Ashgrove Women's Institute; Mrs. Walter Lawson, Stewart-town Women's Institute.

George Currie and William Schenk are council representatives on the board of management of Norval Athletic Club.

F. J. Shortill was appointed as a fenceviewer for the township.

\$230 in fox claims was paid under the county by-law which provides a \$5 bounty for each fox destroyed. Wm. Sheppard, Acton, received \$35, C. S. Bailey, Georgetown, \$50 and Mervin Nessett, Acton \$30. Ten dollar payments went to Bob Lockhurst and George Barber, Georgetown, Cliff Stover, Milton, Ken Allen and Wilmer Watkins, Acton. Five dollar payments to Gordon Shoebridge, Harold Campbell, Harold Bennett, William Gibbs, James Roe, Leslie Norton, and Charles Davies, Georgetown and Grant Stark and William Thompson, Milton.

A by-law was sent for approval to the Dept. of Planning and Development to designate an area of subdivision control, in which, under certain circumstances, land shall not be conveyed unless it is within a registered plan of subdivision.

Relief accounts were \$42; Road accounts \$3978.

Esquering indicated approval of asking the Municipal Board to abandon an order made last year fixing the proportions of school costs in North Halton High School district. This will mean that from now on school costs will be shared among the five municipalities concerned under the equalized assessment used for other county costs.
