He was the only son of Mr. and Mrs. Douglas Thompson of Sundre, Alberta and his mother is the former Helen Young of Georgetown. He is survived by his parents and two sisters, Lynne, 6 and Janet, 2.

CHURCH BUYS OLD FACTORY BUILDING

A two storey brick factory building on Water Street which formerly housed the Lavole Knitting Company has been purchased for use as a church and living quarters by the Pentecostal Church. The building was formerly owned by William Schenk, and at one time was the plant of the Brill Knitting Company, owned jointly by Mr. Schenk and David Brill, now of Toronto. It has been empty since Mr. Lavole built his new factory on Main Street North. Pastor of Zion Tabernacle, as the new church will be called, is Rev. F. M. Fletcher. The building is being remodelled at present and Mr. and Mrs. Fletcher and their family will live in an upstairs apartment.

Mr. Fletcher is a native of Hamilton and his wife comes from Welland. They have three sons, Raymond and Sydney, who are attending public school here, and baby Charles. They came to Georgetown from Ottawa, and prior to that Mr. Fletcher had pastorates in St. Catharines and Mount Dennis. First service in the new church is planned a week from Sunday at three in the afternoon, when special speakers will be present and special musical features are being prepared.

CHRISTMAS SEAL FUND EXCEEDS \$1,000.00

One of the most successful campaigns for funds this year has been the Christmas Seal campaign of Halton TB and Health Association. Normally donations fall off after Christmas but even yet money is being turned in at the Bank of Commerce headquarters. Total to date is \$1083.50. GLEN WILLIAMS WIN ONE, TIE ONE GLEN BEADS LEAGUE

In a game that was a 'must win' for Streetsville as they are facing elimination, Glen Williams defeated them in ORHA hockey 8-6 Friday in Georgetown Arena.

For two periods the Glen was outplayed. The team was short-handed due to injuries and some players having other commitments. Del Beaumont juggled the lines until finally in the 3rd he came up with a line that seemed to catch fire and scored six goals. Streetsville had been leading 5-2, but they had played their best and were not able to hold the Glen pressure. They resorted to rough tactics and three penalties in the last ten minutes didn't help them.

The injury was suffered in a previous practice but had been thought only a bruise. He will be out of action a month. Bud Haines scored 4, Spike Scott 3 and Don Schenk 2. Tie Moffat Game Still unbeaten, Moffat gave the Glen their closest game of the year in Acton Monday, and the game was tied 4-4 after overtime. It was another "must" game for the opposition. The Glen had an edge-on-play but were over-anxious and muffed good scoring chances. Moffat led 4-2 in the 3rd, but Glen Williams tied it up before the whistle blew. Scott had 2, Schenk and Currie one each. With 4 wins and a tie, Glen Williams leads the league. Moffat and Zimmerman each have 3 points and Streetsville 2.
