MUTUAL AID FIREMEN MEET AT ACTON

The Acton Volunteer Fire Department were hosts for the Halton County Mutual Aid meeting, held in the Acton Town Hall, February 8. Chief Clements of Milton presided. W. McLeod represented the Acton council fire committee and spoke briefly in welcoming the Association members to Acton.
Wilfrid Bird, deputy reeve of Esquimaux, spoke concerning the organizing of the districts allotted to Acton, Georgetown and Milton Fire Departments and said that a system of numbering was being

considered for the townships of Esquimaux and Nassagaweya.
Chief Dan Hazel of Hamilton Beach introduced the guest speaker, Chief Putnam of Kitchener, who represented the newly formed Ontario Fire Chief's Association.
Chief Walmaley of Burlington announced the construction of a new Fire Hall to serve Burlington and district. The Cooper Construction Co. of Hamilton have been given the contract to build the two-storey building consisting of three truck bays, with recreation and auxiliary rooms upstairs, at a cost of \$38,000, to be completed in four months.
