FELTS ARE THE RAGE!
Felt it's the rage! You see it everywhere — in skirts, weskits, jackets, matching bags and hats; at dances you see beautiful felt evening skirts. Both the street and evening varieties are decorated with eye-catching designs... of sequins — applied felt figures — jewels — metal figures and chains — hand-painted designs. You find them in every price range.

Felt differs from the many other fabrics used in garments. It is made by felting the fibres together with steam, heat and pressure. The fabric may be made of 100 per cent wool or wool combined with rayon or other fibres. Since the fibres are not twisted into a yarn and woven into a fabric, it does not possess a very high resistance to shrinkage, stretching, or wear, as does a woven fabric. For that reason, your felt garments need special care in wear and in cleaning.

Too much strain or wear on one area may cause a felt fabric to tear or separate. If your skirt is designed so that it may be shifted at the waistline every time you wear it, you'll get longer service from it. Avoid snagging, because once torn, it is almost impossible to mend felt without its being quite noticeable. Worn areas are most likely to occur around pockets or buttons. Sewed areas are more susceptible to tearing.

If you want to help yourself, as well as your drycleaner, take the measurements of your skirt at the waist and hip line and from the waistline to hemline. On your jacket or vest, measure from the shoulder to the jacket edge, the bust line and hip line, from the underarms to the jacket edge.
