United Church Growing Year's Report Shows

Statistical returns indicate allround development in Halton Presbytery of the United Church during 1952 and it would appear that every Charge is going forward and striving effectively to take up the challenge of a developing commun-

Twelve churches' engaged in building extension's and improvements, some of them substantial. Such building operations, with revaluations of some of the older bulldings increased total value of buildings by over half a million dollars; bringing the total to \$1.514-Insurance coverage increased by \$465,000 and the value of parsonages by \$24.890.

Burlington, Appleby-Nelson, Car-Freelton-Strabane, Hornby, Lowville, Palermo-Bronte and Trafalgar met expenditures for building improvement without incurring capital debt. Of the others all but one, including Georgetown, Millgrove. Milton and Oakville each reported capital improvements greater than the increased liabili-

Overall church membership in Halton increased by 330. Two hundred and seventy five joined the church on profession of faith and increased membership ranged from 53 at Burlington to two at Hornby. In the smaller charges, Lowville with 25 and Millgrove with 23 were particularly notable. Georgetown had an increase of 36. The presbytery received 145 more by letter of transfer than were lost,

An increased enrolment of 231 in Sunday Schools and an increase in average attendance of 392 showed progress in this department of church life. Five schools conducted leadership education classes, 25 gave missionary instruction and 17 temperance instruction. Fifteen had preparation classes, 165_scholars joined the church. There was an increase in givings of \$2835. Vacation schools doubled in number from four to eight. On the other hand through-the-week organizations dropped from 58 to 55 and their membership dropped by 309.

Missionary and maintenance, which includes all the general "outreach" work of the church, has been well sustained and the target figure which represented a 10 per cent increase on the previous year won by Mrs. Richardson, Norval. was slightly exceeded, the amount of increase being \$2,674. Ministers' from Farnell's was Mrs. Ted Arnsalaries and transporation were increased by \$4,000.
