In his meditation Rev. We sometimes question this when we think of the state of our world, but we need to remember that He does not wish to make us mere puppets. He has given us the discernment to know that which is good, and that

which is evil; also the power to choose which we will serve; He has exhorted us to do good; He has taught us that evil brings dire consequences; so until we choose to follow His way of good, we can not have the world we would like, even the world He desires. We need to remember that He is also a righteous Judge. With the free will He has given us, and the nature we have developed, any other would bring utter ruin and disaster to our world. Spare the rod and spoil the child, applies even in God's realm. He must be just, for our own good, for the good of others. and for the ultimate good of His world. So, as we are told "The mills of God grind slowly, but they grind exceedingly small." But with His Righteous Judgment, we know He is a loving Father, ready to forgive when we recognize our guilt; confess our wrongdoing, and our penitence is sincere.
