**FOND HOPE SON TO HEAD ELGIN HERD**

A high class herd sire has been secured by R. Tansley & Son, St. Thomas to head their purebred Holstein herd. He is the sixteen months old bull, Hunterholm Fond Laddie, bred by A. G. Hunter, Burlington. The three nearest dams of this bull have an average production of 15,959 lbs. milk, 617 lbs. butterfat, average test 3.87 per cent.

Fond Laddie, is a son of the XXX and three times All-Canadian bull, Spring Farm Fond Hope. Fond Hope has twice combined with his famous six times All-Canadian sister, Spring Farm Juliette, to take the All-Canadian Produce of Dam award.

The dam of Fond Laddie has a yearly record made as a two year

old on twice a day milking of 611 lbs. fat from 13,481 lbs. milk, average test 4.53 percent butterfat. She is a grand-daughter of the noted class "Extra" sire, Montvic Rag Apple Marksman who has been seven times an All-Canadian winner and has an average production on the 225 records of his daughters of 17,033 lbs. milk containing 664 lbs. fat, average test 3.90 per cent butterfat.

**Why Young Men Went West Explained by a Pioneer**

Some time ago we talked with a Glen Williams district resident, J. A. McClure, who went west with he was a young man, and was one of the many native Ontarians who helped to build the west from wilderness to the settled communities of today.

Mr. McClure said he has often been asked why he went to the west, and it might be interesting for readers to know his feelings.

This week, we have the first article written by him, which he will follow with others from time to time. Here is how he puts it, in his own words.

In talking to many of my old schoolmates and others since I came back from Saskatchewan to live in Ontario, they often ask if I do not think I would be better off if I had stayed there, in place of going to what apparently seems to some of them a sort of Godforsaken part of the world.

Not being able to satisfactorily explain in the limited time one has in street corner chatting, it has occurred to me that I could write it, in this article. Perhaps I can show them why some men pulled their feet from under their parents' tables, left everything and everybody they ever knew and headed two or three thousand miles away where they never saw anyone they ever met before, and stayed for what would seem the best part of their lives. To start with, let us remember the world is all God's country and the people are all God's people.

You can hardly give a boy of twenty years credit for much forethought, but anyone can have a backsight of prospects. Along from 1890 to 1900 the prospects were not very enticing for the youngest of a family of five boys and two girls, supposed to be farmers on 100 acres of land in Ontario. There were five boys and four girls on both of the adjoining farms, which were not very well built or equipped with machinery. And no one apparently planning on any future except to stick around on the farm, or go into debt for more land. No one advised this, knowing that it took our parents all their lives to pay for a home and raise a family.

Of course, it is not easy for the only boy in a family, with prospects of some day taking over a couple of hundred acres of well equipped farm, with money in the bank, to have the same view of life as the one with less prospects.

So after several years of youthful observation, some worldly knowledge, and faith in man, our creator and ourselves, some few young men untied the apron strings and said "Here goes, for better or worse." The better or worse, as it turned out, depended to a large extent on the man himself.

I am not saying it was easy to do, or that one never got homesick or lonesome for familiar places and people. Nor do I say that we did not appreciate our home and the moral and spiritual training we received. It all helped more than a person who never missed it will appreciate. It helped to meet temptations and make better decisions as we went along in life in an entirely different atmosphere to what we ever knew existed.

When you get away from the protection of home, day and night rubbing shoulders with the evils of life, you are the better for some influencing background to steer you away from the temptation of thinking "I'm not known here. No one will ever find out, and I may as well try some of these things so many appear to enjoy."

Whether you miss these things or fall for them depends greatly on earlier teachings, and your own determination not to have all the trouble one's best friends had laying down certain rules of what they found was right and wrong, and what stood best for them mentally and physically, all lost.

If each generation would try and seek out and follow what has best served humanity and the world in general in past generations, we would surely be making more head way on the road of life. You know we can have a lot of real red-blooded fun without getting drunk, breaking too many man-made or natural laws.

I never like to be too critical of the one who appear to fall easy prey to the evils of life. Nor do I think some of us should have too much credit for holding out against the evils of the day. You know there are some children who don't have to stick their heads into a stove before they believe their parents, that fire will burn them. Why, in a generation when we can read and write and have records of the past, do we not benefit more from the (continued on Page 9)
