Tax Rate Remains at 43 Mills

Lowest Rate in North Halton, Says Mayor

Good news for Georgetown property owners, is council's decision to make no increase in the 1953 tax rate over last year.

The 43 mill rate was maintained when council passed a \$217,000 budget of expenses, a \$6500 increase over last year. Taxpayers will have a total levy of \$164,500 to pay.

No essential services have been reduced, although the road budget was looped by \$3,000, and the finance committee recommended a decrease in the street staff from 7

On the credit side, council budgeted for \$3,500 from the sale of the Old Town Hall, and \$4,000 in supplementary taxes, mostly from building of the new Smith & Stone

Council plans to use \$6,000 surplus to keep the tax rate constant. It is hoped to realize this by converting a large share of uncollected taxes into cash. A \$1300 increase in garbage collection costs was in the budget. The Cemetery Board, which last year took only half their grant, has asked for the full amount, boosting expense about \$1900. Public School costs increased \$5500. High school costs, though not increased in total, added \$2,000 to Georgetown's tax rate, because the town has agreed to drop a financial gain at Esquesing's expense, in order to proceed with building

a high school addition. Finance Minister McGilvray and his committee were congratulated by Mayor Armstrong, on their work in keeping the tax rate down. He said Georgetown could be particularly proud of the fact that the rate is lower than in any other North Halton municipality. This rate has also been held for a three-year per-

Taxes will be payable in three instalments, May 15th, July 15th and September 15th.
