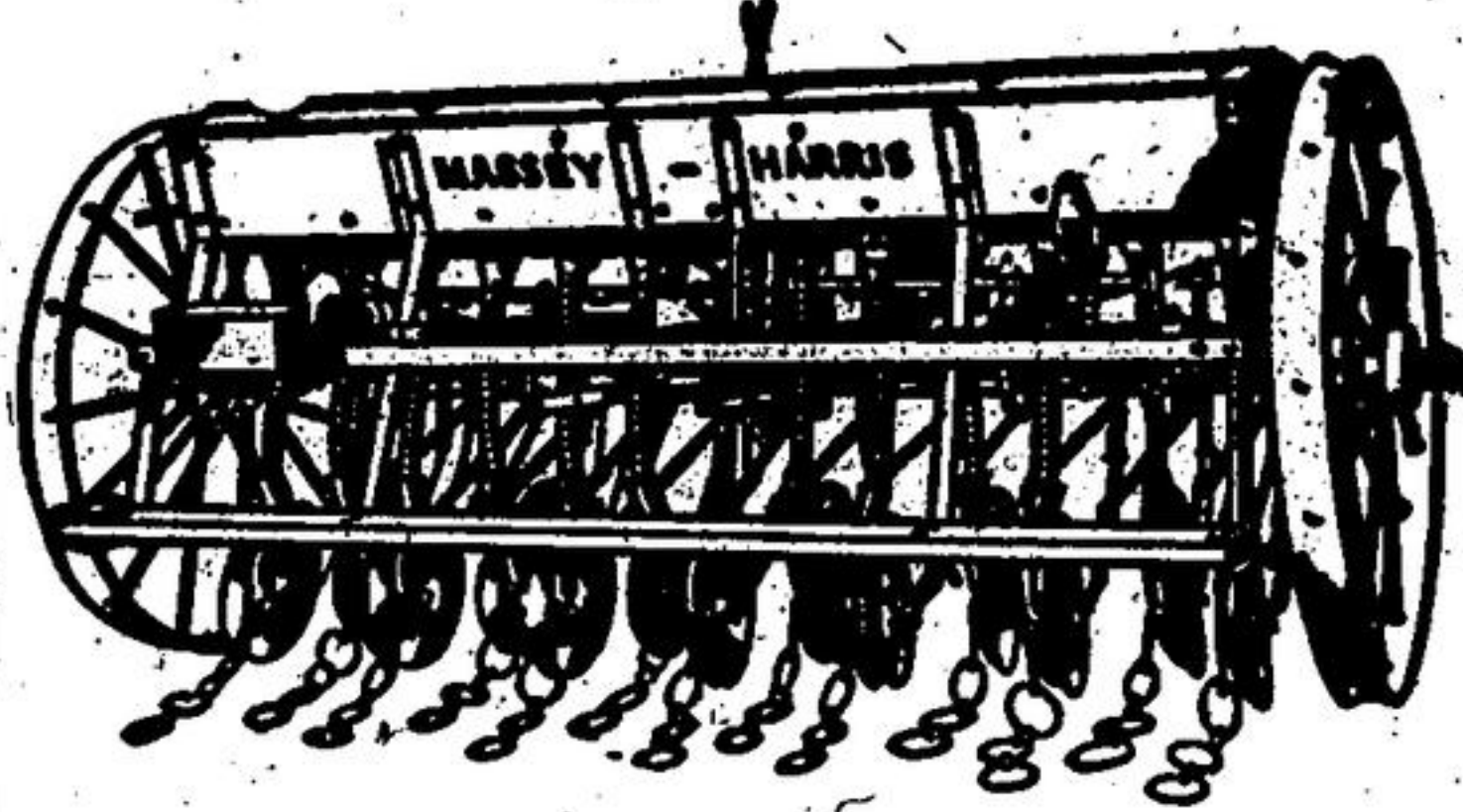

Sybil Bennett Speaks Over CBC National Hook-up

Sybil Bennett, QC, Progressive-Conservative candidate for Halton in the next federal election, was one of four ladies who spoke last night on a CBC radio broadcast.

The ladies were featured on The Nation's Business and spoke on the subject "It's Your Money" as a political broadcast for the Progressive-Conservative party.

Ellen Fairclough, M.P., Lorraine Johnston and Elizabeth Janzen were others on the programme. Text of Miss Bennett's speech follows:

The Progressive Conservative party, when elected has pledged itself to reduce taxes and you will ask how we propose to do this and maintain the defence and social security programs and other essential services in this country.

The general answer, is the elimination of waste and extravagance and wild spending which it appears runs into hundreds of dollars. As Mr. Currie pointed out in his report "nobody knows how many millions are being wasted."

There is no way of knowing because the Government refuses to investigate or allow anybody else to investigate this spending. Over and over again the Progressive-Conservative Opposition has demanded enquiries and has been constantly refused. The small part of defence spending investigated by Mr. Currie covered only one per cent of defence spending. It was as though we were given a look into one room of a one hundred room building. When it was found to be in a mess the doors to all other rooms were bolted to make sure nobody had a look in them. It is difficult for the average taxpayer to understand waste running into millions and millions of dollars but a few examples will indicate perhaps the sort of thing that is going on.

The Defence Department purchased over 29,000 aluminum two-quart teapots when the use of these was obsolete due to cafeteria service in the army depots. At a time when there were nine hundred members of the Canadian Women's Army Corps (and the authorized strength is only fifteen hundred) 15,000 raincoats were ordered, more than sixteen raincoats per person.

From 1952 to 1953 the Defence Department spent for telephones and telegrams alone the huge sum of nearly \$5,000,000 at the rate of \$13,500.00 for every day of the year including Sunday. In non-defence spending the Central Mortgage and Housing Corporation put up an office building in Ottawa costing more than \$2,000,000. They spent \$2500 for a spring filled floor on which to dance and all this while thousands of Canadians had improper and inadequate housing.

From these few items it is evident that the government has lost not only its supervision and control over the management and spending of its Departments but it has also lost its sense of responsibility to the Canadian people to such a degree, that it has neither the will, the energy nor the competence to remedy or correct the same.

You, the people of Canada, can put a stop to this reckless and unprecedented spending of your money and restore to this country sound, frugal and efficient government by electing the Progressive-Conservative Party to power at the next federal election.
