Winter Fair President Is Top Shorthorn Man

One of Canada's leading Scotch Shorthorn breeders, S. G. Bennett, R. R. 1, Georgetown, is the new president of the Royal Agrivututral Winter Fair.

Mr. Bennett is also an industrialist, born in Toronto, a graduate of the University of Toronto in Engineering. He was taking a course in Political Economy at Oxford from where he joined up in 1914 with the Royal Engineers, winning the Military Cross and being twice mentioned in despatches. After the war he was on the faculty of the University of Toronto for six years until he entered industry with Beardmore and Company, of which he is now president. He is also the vice president of Canada Packers wand a director of several important companies.

It is as a farmer and breeder, however, that Mr. Bennett, who has been vice president of the Royal for the past two years, has been promoted to head the Fair in its 25th or Silver Jubilee Year. No hobby farmer, he has owned and lived for 15 years on Scotsdale Farms at Silvercreek, forty miles from downtown Toronto. He has gradually added to his original acreage until the farm now approximates 600 acres. His Scotsdale Farms herd of purebred Shorthorns has won an international reputation.

Highlights of the herd's wins include victories at the Royal and at Chicago, where Scotsdale Shorthorns have been shown since 1947 in which year Scotsdale had the grand champion bull, 1948 grand champion bull, 1949 senior and reserve champion bull, 1951 grand champion bull, 1952 supreme champion, champion female and reserve champion bull. In 1952 Mr. Bennett was declared premier breeder and exhibitor of Shorthorns at the Royal. The Bennett 1948 Grand champion bull at the Royal, Scots-

dale Bombadier, went on to win the International grand championship at Chicago.

In the Sales of Stars which are an important feature of the Royal, Bennett Shorthorns have brought top prices. In 1950, the first year of the auctions, a Scotsdale animal was top-price bull, bringing \$2550. In 1951 the herd's entries in the sales won top average. Last year a Scotsdale female topiped the sale at \$3100.

An enthusiastic supporter of the breeders' and government joint efforts to build up the quality of Shorthorn herds, Mr. Bennett has sent bulls from his herd to the annual Government buil sale sponsored by the Ontario Department of Agriculture. At the first such sale, in 1951, a Scotsdale bull topped bids at \$2050. In 1952 Mr. Bennett had the champion and top-selling bull, which sold for \$1625. He duplicated this showing at the 1953 sale, recently held, with a bull which

went for \$1750. In 1952, when he decided that after 14 years his herd had reached a standard where its further advancement necessitated the purchase of the best bull available anywhere, Mr. Bennett went to Scotland to the historic Shorthorn sale at Perth with Mr. Maurice Baker, who is in charge of the Scotsdale herd, and bought the 1952 Supreme Champion bull, Calrossic Prefect for 6100 gumeas.

Canadian born calves by Calrossie Prefect are now arriving in the Scotsdale herd, as well as the progeny of Calrossie Golden Road, bought at Perth in 1951, a. halfbrother of Calrossic Prefect. No doubt some of these calves will appear at future Royals.

Scotsdale Shorthorns are housed in refitted old buildings on a number of adjoining farms in attractive, rolling, wooded country, but Scotsdale is not meant to be a showplace, but a practical breeding cen-

In addition to his business and farming, Mr. Bennett is on the board of the Toronto Art Gallery, and is chairman of the tariff committee of the Canadian Manufacturers' Association.

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
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
