

## What Council Did

**ON MONDAY, APRIL 4th**  
Will extend water service to a portion of the Tvers subdivision for Pachelok Brothers, when the survey plan is approved and the contractors have installed streets. The firm is contracting to build a minimum of ten houses on the property behind Normandy Boulevard, and has asked the town for a guarantee of water service when this is done.

Heard that the police have been taking some action, at council's request, to check speeding on the 9th Line, and that one charge has already been laid.

Were asked by Walter Blehn to remove a dead tree on his property on McNabb Street.

Gave Mrs. D. W. Shier permission to hook up to the town water service at Silvercreek. Mrs. Shier is to pay expenses of installing the service and will pay double rates, as called for by out-of-town users. During a discussion on Mrs. Shier's request, Mayor Armstrong said he thought the time would come when the Silvercreek reservoir would be abandoned and there would no longer be town water available there. Reeve MacDonald believes the town will eventually have two water towers in place of the reservoir for storage.

Turned over to the police committee a request from the Public School Board that some action be taken to deal with the problem of dogs around the school. Already two teachers and a child have been bitten, and the school board is concerned about it.

Hired Sam Harrison to read water meters at his tender price of \$250 a year.

This was one of two tenders received, the other being for \$300 from Freeman Kersey.

Set the annual grant to the Fire Brigade at \$1350 and increased the chief's salary to \$175 and salaries of deputy chief and driver each to \$90.

Increased the garbage contract held by Bob Lane to \$5,500.

Crs. Allen and Hale both spoke strongly against the motion and voted against it. Mr. Allen said a jump from \$4200 to \$5500 in a few years was too much and he thinks garbage could be collected cheaper by the town men. He also said the time is approaching when the town will have to secure another garbage dump, and he believes one man would be interested in tendering for collection and supplying a site if such were advertised.

Cr. McGilvray opined that Mr. Lane has done an excellent job and has been giving a cheap service for several years. Cr. Petch opposes any municipal collection on the grounds that people would expect too much. Cr. Sargent pointed out that the \$5,500 figure amounts to about 6c a call, while Brampton, which has a private service, pays 25c a week. Reeve MacDonald said that Milton, a much smaller town, pays \$5,000. Cr. Goodlet, who once was an exponent of municipal collection, said Mr. Lane isn't being overpaid at this figure and that people are well satisfied with the present service.

Will have the road committee investigate a request from W. F. Bradley for an extension of Water Street, in order to build three houses on property behind Berwick Hall.

Cr. Norton is concerned about the danger of dead end streets and the problem which sometimes arises in diverting water onto private property thru' erection of new streets. Road chairman Allen said council must have an eye to the future and if a road is put into the property, it must be graded to allow for a hook-up with Maple Avenue if Maple Ave. is ever extended.

Tentative approval was given to suggestions of Harold Cleave that if and when some of his land behind Ray Whitmee's is subdivided, the town will supply necessary services when a guarantee of the building of a certain number of houses is received.

Similar approval was also given to a possible subdivision on land owned by Tom Hewson on Ewing Street.

Assessment Commissioner Joseph Gibbons dealt at some length with the assessment question, both locally and on a county scale.

Mr. Gibbons said there is some talk of having the three northern urban towns, Georgetown, Acton

and Milton, drop a 15 per cent location obsolescence which is at present allowed for county purposes, with the township dropping the 15 per cent on residences only. This, he fears, would react unfavourably for Georgetown, which would pay a higher county rate. He feels that Georgetown itself is quite equitably assessed, comparing any one property with others and is also equitably assessed compared with Milton and Acton. Any future trouble in the county, he feels, will be arguments between rural and urban municipalities, concerning the location obsolescence factor.

At Cr. Allen's suggestion, will put some gravel fill along the highway where sewerage installation has churned up a muddy situation, and where eventually a sidewalk will be placed.

Regarding an extension of Charles Street which is being made thru' to Young Street, Cr. Allen said he would like an engineer's opinion on how high it should be. A property owner, he says, claims the road is being made too high and too much fill will be needed to put building lots in proper shape. Cr. McGilvray stated that he did not think the road should be built up higher than the existing houses, namely, Sargent's and Davidson's as it would only trap the water and a pond would surround the houses.

Will provide sewerage services for J. J. Gibbens, with a line going along the alley running from Back Street to the highway. The old Gilman Dairy property will be assessed for this.

Concerning enquiries which he had made, Cr. Sargent said there is no provision in the Municipal Act for a by-law to force sub-dividers to include cost of services when they sell property. Etobicoke has a matter of policy which they have been using to accomplish the same end, while Toronto Township strikes a bargain with each individual sub-divider.
