County Continues Farm Pond Subsidy

Halton County Council at their last session on March 10th approved the continuance of the farm pond policy inaugurated a year ago.

Under this policy the Ont. Dept. of Agriculture matches the county, dollar for dollar, up to a maximum grant for 1953 of \$1,000. In other words the Halton Conservation Committee, under the chairmanship of George Currie, Esquesing Twp. will have a fund of \$2,000 from which grants or subsidies up to a maximum of \$100 each will be paid on ponds constructed in accordance with the regulations of the Halton Farm Pond Policy.

Any farmer interested in constructing a farm pond or duffout in 1953 should contact the Milton Office of the Ontario Dept. of Agriculture, and secure a copy of the rules and regulations. At the same time applicants may complete a


