Main Street Merchant Succumbs to Stroke

Familiar to all Georgetown residents through her long association as a Main Street businesswoman, Mrs. A. E. Farnell, 63, was buried in Greenwood Cemetery on Friday after the funeral service at the Mc-Clure Funeral Home.
