**Main Street Merchant  
Succumbs to Stroke**

Familiar to all Georgetown residents through her long association as a Main Street businesswoman, Mrs. A. E. Farnell, 63, was buried in Greenwood Cemetery on Friday after the funeral service at the McClure Funeral Home.

Mrs. Farnell succumbed at Peel Memorial Hospital Wednesday morning to a severe stroke which she suffered the week before.

She was born at Appley, a daughter of Richard Graham and Annie Alderson, and was the former Annie Warwick Graham. The family later moved to a farm near Norval and following her marriage to Albert E. Farnell in 1910, she lived at Ballinafad. Mr. Farnell and his brother-in-law W. A. Gardiner purchased a general store there from Richard Hewins, and the following year Mr. Farnell became sole owner of the business. In 1927 he sold out to J. F. Kirkwood and purchased the present grocery store in Georgetown from Mrs. A. M. Grandy. Since Mr. Farnell's death two years ago, the business has been conducted by Mrs. Farnell and their son Graham.

Mrs. Farnell was a faithful member of St. John's United Church. She leaves her son, Graham, two grandchildren, Carroll and David, a sister Margaret, Mrs. Ern Thompson of town and two brothers, William T. of Norval and Christopher of Burlington. A brother John died in 1938.

Rev. John M. Smith was assisted at the funeral service by Rev. R. C. Todd of Niagara Falls, a former minister at St. John's. Pallbearers were Kenneth M. Latogdon, Walter Gray, Malcolm McNabb, Hector Bird, Sid Morris and William H. Reid.

**JACK WHITNEY WAS  
TWO WAR VETERAN**

A Georgetown resident for thirty years, and veteran of two wars, John O. Whitney, 56, died at his home on Thursday after a short illness.

Born in Toronto, Mr. Whitney served overseas with the 58th Battalion in the first war. After the war he worked in Toronto until he came to Georgetown in 1923. He was employed with the late Clarence Buck at his store for fifteen years until he enlisted in the Veterans' Guard in 1939, and served in various parts of Canada and the U.S. until war's end.

He is survived by his wife, Verna Rogers, one daughter Rhoda, Mrs. Don Taylor, and three sons: Albert, John and Bill. Also surviving are four sisters, Mrs. O. M. Houston, of Georgetown, Miss Bertha Whitney, Norval, Mrs. George Tracey, Sudbury and Mrs. Ethel Goodes, Niagara Falls.

He then worked with Bradey Brothers at their butcher shop, and for the past several years had been a security policeman at Smith and Stone, Ltd. Mr. and Mrs. Whitney had moved into their new home behind Normandy Boulevard less than a year ago.

Rev. John M. Smith conducted the funeral service on Saturday at the McClure Funeral Home. An active member for many years of Branch 120, Canadian Legion, the Legion service was conducted under the direction of President Leslie Clark. Pallbearers were Lt.-Col. Gordon Brown, Basil Hadley, Jack Smith, Roy McGill, Alex Taylor and Orby Herrington. Interment was in Hillcrest Cemetery, Norval.
