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County Association Plans Extensive Soil, Crop Program

An extensive programme of soi and crop projects is being sponsored by the County Soil and Crop Improvement Association in various sections of Halton this year. According to president Fred Nurse, well known Ashgrove farmer, these will

include the following:-1. Tests with ammonium nitrate on winter wheat on 16 farms; Ammonium Nitrate vs. Ammo Phos on meadows on 5 farms; 3, Methods of Seeding, 1 new test to be laid down in 1953 and a follow-up on five similar tests laid down in 1951 and 1952; 4 Dates of Seeding, this r involves sowing red clover and .alfalfa on winter wheat on Jan. 1-t Feb. 1st, March 1, April 1 and 15th (1 farm); 5 Mulching vs. Cultivation with Corn; 6, Variety tests with 8 varieties of corn both for silage and grain purposes (2 farms); 7. Variety test with 8 varieties of soybeans (1 farm); 8, variety test with 8 varieties of both oats 'and soybeans (1 farm); 9, A 4H Forage Club, this involves sowing one acre of an improved hay-pasture mixture using improved strains of Brome, Orchard, and Timothy along with Alfalfa and Red Clover. Fifteen club members will check this mixture against their home mix-

Tentative plans are also under way to check the relative merits of Hyperphosphate (an African prodduct), against Rock phosphate, Superphosphate, and a complete fer-

tilizer, on Meadows. The association also sponsored a fifty bushel winter 'wheat club last fall and there is a strong likelihood of a bus trip being organized to the state of Michigan.
