Speaker at Church**

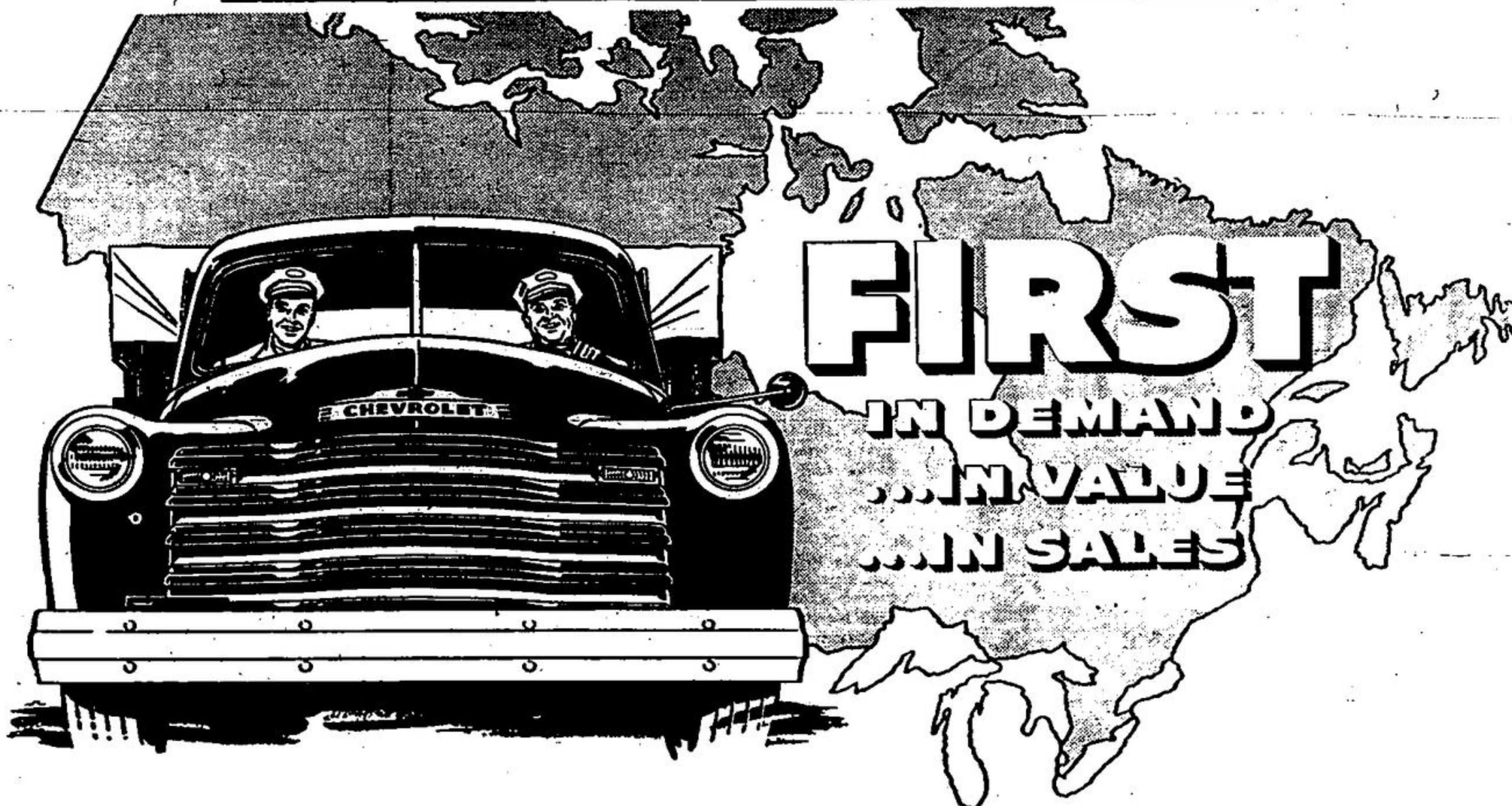
